FARM SAFETY DISCUSSED AT 4-H CLUB MEETING

An interesting quiz program and discussion on farm safety and accident prevention on the farm was the main feature on the program at the monthly meeting of the Rebersburg 4-H Agricultural Club held at the Russell Cranstler farm on Monday.

Robert Cranstler, president, presided at the meeting and opened the discussion of projects work for 1945. The

club decided to limit their projects to dairy calves, feeder pigs, capons and tomatoes.

This group has accomplished an enviable record in Centre County by having met once each month during the entire year. During the winter

months, they developed a farm shop program. The winter series of meetings which started in October included demonstrations in the selection and use of tools, the construction and use of individual pens for dairy calves, and a farm application

of rope work. This latter meeting included knot tying, rope splicing and the construction of a rope halter. In this series of meetings, the Rebersburg 4-H Club members planned and constructed equipment such as calf pens and pig feeders, which

they will use in project work during the coming year. An interesting movie in color, "4-H Fire Prevention Club Work," was shown which pointed out another phase of the safety and accident prevention idea.
