1942. He trained at Maxwell Field, Ala., Americus, Ga., Greenwood, Miss., and took his final training at Barksdale Field, La. He went overseas in August of last year and is believed to have gone into action shortly after arriving there.

In high school he was a member of the wrestling team and of the football team of which he was captain his senior year. His father is in charge of the music department at the high school. A brother, Maj. Lloyd Smith is serving with the Office of Strategic Services.

Pvt. Kolassa Wounded

Mrs. Anna Kolassa, of Clarence, Monday received a War Department telegram informing that her son, Pvt. Frank J. Kolassa, 19, was seriously wounded in Germany on February 19. The hospital address of the wounded man was given but the message did not reveal in what country the hospital is located.

The Clarence soldier, who was serving with the 38th Infantry unit of General Patton's Third Army, wrote a letter to his mother two days after being wounded. It read in part: "No doubt you have already heard I was hurt. My wounds are healing nicely and don't worry about me." The letter was written in Luxembourg.

Pvt. Kolassa was called for service in July of last year and he trained at Ft. McClellan, Ala., until early last December when he spent a furlough at home. He then went to Ft. Meade, Md., and late the same month was sent overseas, landing in France.
