Pvt. Muirhead, 23, arrived in Bellefonte Monday for a 30-day furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Muirhead, of Burnside street. Pvt. Muirhead recently returned to the United States after serving 32 months overseas, including service in North Africa, the Italian area and finally France and Belgium. He was twice wounded in the North African campaign, and received the Purple Heart and Bar for military merit.

While in action in France he contracted a foot condition from which blood poisoning developed and he was hospitalized for some time overseas before being sent back to this country for further treatment. He came to Bellefonte from a government hospital at Camp Pickett, Va., and will return there at the expiration of his furlough. Pvt. Muirhead enlisted in the service on January 21, 1942.
