

Evacuation Hospitals Have Tremendous Job

Wherever doughboys were engaged in battle in the Mediterranean and European theatres, the U. S. Seventh Army's veteran 9th Evacuation Hospital was there behind them, administering skilled medical aid.

The first American evacuation hospital to operate as such on the other side of the Atlantic ocean, the 9th has been in continuous operation for more than two years in Tunisia, Sicily, Italy and France, and has treated more than 41,932 Allied and enemy patients.

Now supporting combat units of Lt. Gen. Jacob L. Devers' 6th Army Group, this hospital has broken many records in France where it has treated 12,639 patients. Landing on August 25 in Southern France, the 9th traveled 185 miles inland to open a full-scale operation 54 hours after the hospital staff had set foot on French soil.

The hospital—set up in tents and often within earshot of Seventh Army guns—admitted at one area 378 patients during the first 30 hours of operation. During September its record admissions were 2,359 surgical and 1,086 medical patients. Surgical teams operated on 16-hour shifts, performing, in 27 days, 2,037 surgical procedures which included 133 head operations.

"Our hospital gives first definite surgery to casualties before evacuation to larger hospitals in the rear where post-operative care is administered," explained Colonel William E. Stone of Booneville, Mo., hospital commander. "This means that we debride the doughboy's wounds and perform operations necessary to improve his general physical condition to a degree which will make him fit for evacuation by air, train, or ambulance."

An affiliated unit of the Roosevelt Hospital of New York City, the 9th treated 1,698 patients at one area in Tunisia without a single death. In Italy it operated a general hospital for French soldiers and received 6,675 patients.

Houtzdale Soldier Killed in France

John Selvage, of Houtzdale, received a telegram from the War Department, stating his son, S/Sgt. James Selvage, was killed in action in Germany on February 9th.

Only a week previous his parents received a telegram saying he was missing in action in France, February 9.

Sgt. Selvage was 38 years old and had been in the service 18 years on March 9.

Besides his parents, he is survived by the following brothers and sisters: John, of Brisbit; Raymond, of Baltimore, Md.; Mrs. Richard Waite and Mrs. Grover Waite, of Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. Walter Wood, of Phillipsburg, and Ruth and Ellen, at home. A brother and sister preceded him in death.

Signalman Gates Home Over Weekend

Earle G. Gates, signalman 3/c, of the Armed Guard aboard the SS Frederick Victory, arrived in port from France and spent the weekend with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Gates of Mingoville.

A certificate, authorizing Earle to wear the Bronze Star on his African-European theater of war ribbon, was granted him for services aboard the William B. Giles in the Mediterranean during an aerial attack.

Signalman Gates has completed two years of service in the Navy, having been at sea the past fourteen months, making six trips to the African and European war theaters.

BROTHER AND SISTER IN SERVICE

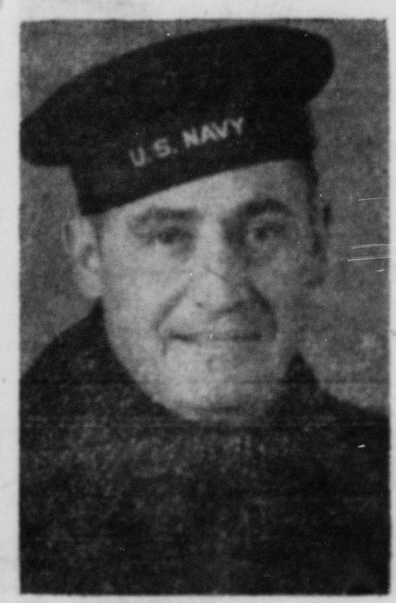

Lt. Hipple Now Flying On Combat Missions

2nd Lt. William F. Hipple, Glenside, Pa., pilot of a B-24 Liberator bomber, has arrived overseas and is now flying combat missions. The announcement was made by Col. LeRoy L. Stefanowicz, Wildrose, North Dakota, the group commander. Lieutenant Hipple has been assigned to Col. Stefanowicz's group, a veteran organization of the 15th Air Force. This group has flown more than 195 combat missions since beginning operations 14 months ago. It twice has been cited "for outstanding performance of duty in armed conflict with the enemy."

Lt. Zimmerman Back In United States

1st Lt. William C. Zimmerman, 24 of Bellefonte, has arrived at Army Air Forces Redistribution Station No. 2 in Miami Beach for reassignment proceeding after completing a tour of duty outside the continental United States. Medical examinations and classification interviews at this post, pioneer of several redistribution stations operated by the AAF Personnel Distribution Command for AAF returnee officers and enlisted men, will determine his new assignment. He will remain at the redistribution station about two weeks, much of which will be devoted to rest and recreation.

Rebersburg Soldier Receives Citation

Bierly, son of Mrs. Madeline Bierly, Rebersburg, rifleman, has been cited by the 361st Infantry Regiment of the 1st "Powder River" Division and awarded the Combat Infantryman Badge for actual participation against the enemy on the Fifth Army front in northern Italy. The handsome badge consists of a silver rifle set against a background of infantry blue, enclosed in a silver wreath.
