

The first American evacuation hospital to operate as such on the other side of the Atlantic ocean, the 9th has been in continuous operation for more than two years in Tunisia, Sicily, Italy and France, and has treated more than 41,932 Allied and enemy patients.

Now supporting combat units of Lt. Gen. Jacob L. Devers' 6th Army Group, this hospital has broken many records in France where it has treated 12,639 patients. Landing on August 25 in Southern France, the 9th traveled 185 miles inland to open a full-scale operation 54 hours after the hospital staff had set foot n French soil.
