The Earl Weston family are driving another car which they purchased last week. Dennis Watson was a caller at the Ed Bush home Sunday morning.

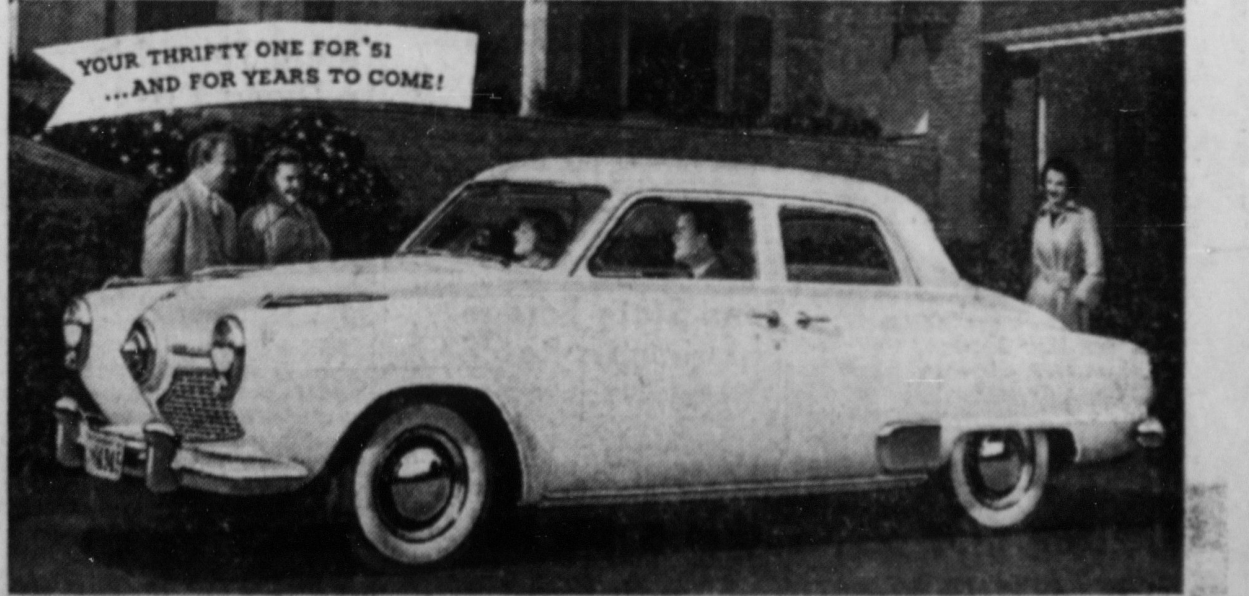
RUNVILLE
