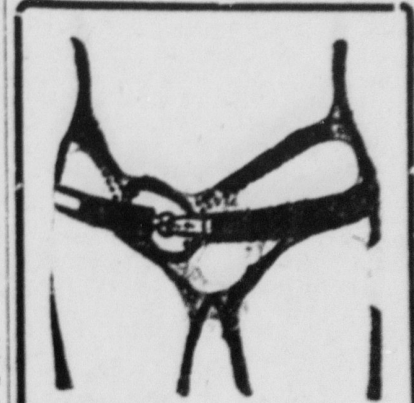

The best of the earlier exam-les were made of mahogany; simpler ones were of cherry, maple, or a sorted native hardwoods, stained red to simulate mahogany. Most of the later ones were of black walnut or some times of butternut. The desk illustrated is black walnut, probably made about 1850 by a small middle western furniture factory. It is now in the Nelson Dewey house at Cassville, Wisconsin, now maintained as a house museum in cooperation with the Wisconsin State Historical Society.

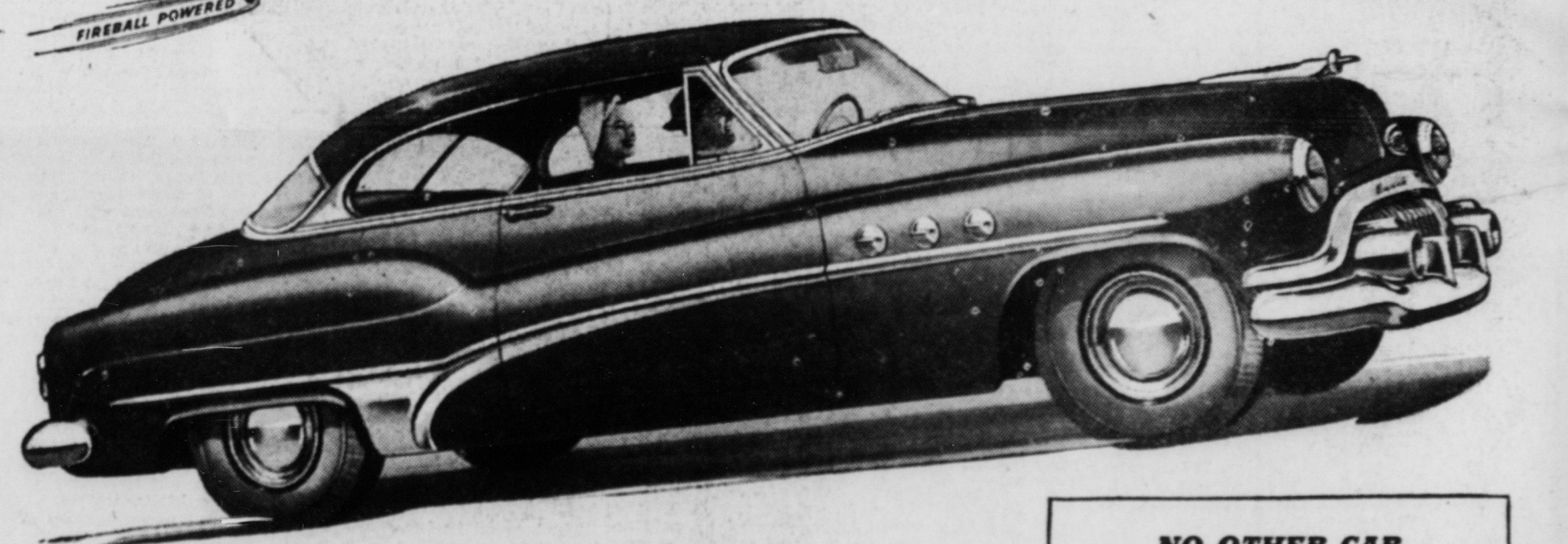
