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Choose Plant Materials Wisely
In planting the home grounds, choose plant materials which will not outgrow the space within a few years, advises County Agent L. H. Bull. Buy plants from reliable certified nurseries, preferably from those which are located within the county or nearby counties. This usually assures that the plants will be adapted to the soil conditions and will thrive under similar growing conditions. In selecting plants, consider time of bloom, berry and bark, coloration, hardness, and suitability for the purpose for which they are to be used. Consider dwarf to intermediate plants for foliage planting. Tall plants can be used more effectively in the shrub border or for individual specimens if space permits. In choosing evergreens, both narrow-leaved and broad-leaved types, the same requirements prevail. Avoid using tall-growing types of pine, spruce, fir, or hemlock for foundation plantings. Consider dwarf and intermediate types of yews, junipers, arbutus, and cypresses. Hardy types of azaleas, andromeda, rhododendron, laurel, and other ericaceous plants can be used if the soil conditions are acid. The county agent warns: Don't be misled in choosing planting materials when you buy small plants at roadside stands. Know the nature of the plant, how tall and how broad it will grow, and whether or not it is a suitable plant for placement on your home grounds. Father Misunderstood
