(Continued from Page One) the citizenry of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Should the bill become law, those who refuse to sign a loyalty pledge would then lose their jobs for failure to do so.

Another bill before the Legislature, the Commander went on to say, would make it mandatory that a certain hour of every day be laid aside to teach the principles of the republican form of government in the United States to the students in the public schools.

Commander McCracken spoke on the present overall program of the Department of the American Legion. He placed strong emphasis on the fact that the Legion is not primarily a social organization, that it stands for definite principles of Americanism, and it was up to the Legion membership to support those principles in whatever action is necessary, otherwise, Commander McCracken went on, if such were not the case then the Legion best adopt some other program. He asserted that the Legion should have a more spirited and definite program in order to attract a larger membership. For example he cited the case of Philadelphia which has a total Legion membership of 25,000. According to Commander McCracken it should boast a total of 100,000.

The Department Commander gave a very graphic account of the results of the "Bob Smith Fund" raised for the benefit of Bob Smith, first quadriple amputee of the Korean war. He said that to date \$100,000 has been accumulated, and is being administered by State Legion officials and the Real Estate Trust Company of Philadelphia.

Commander McCracken concluded his talk by reviewing the Legion's Veteran Rehabilitation Program saying that it has achieved remarkable success to date. He also touched on the present National Veterans' Hospital Fund sponsored by the Legion, saying that it has been misunderstood somewhat, but emphasizing the importance of local Legion posts contributing local talent, or financing outside talent to entertain veterans now in Veterans' hospitals.

Following the conclusion of his speech Commander McCracken was given a standing ovation by Legionnaires present. Other prominent Legionnaires introduced were Lee Wertz of Tyrone, department chairman of Graves Registration, and Boxing Coach Ed Sulkowski of Penn State.

Following the meeting Coach Sulkowski showed movies of the boxing meet between Penn State and Army.

In the Matter of Amendments to Articles of Incorporation of ALUMNI ASSOCIATION OF NU CHAPTER OF ALPHA CHI SIGMA FRATERNITY. In the Court of Common Pleas of Centre County, Pennsylvania, No. 77 February Term, 1951.

NOTICE is hereby given that application will be made to the above Court on Monday, March 26, 1951, at 10:00 A. M., for the purpose of amending the Charter of the Alumni Association of Nu Chapter of Alpha Chi Sigma Fraternity, a nonprofit corporation incorporated under the Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, approved April 19, 1874, as amended.

The purpose is to amend certain paragraphs of the Charter to read as follows:

"SECOND. The Purposes for which said corporation is formed are: The promotion of the moral and social culture of its members, the building of an association that recognizes mutual assistance in the honorable labors and aspirations of life, devotion to the cultivation of the intellect, unselfish friendship and unflinching fidelity, as objects worthy of the highest aim and purposes of associated effort, and for the accomplishment of said purposes, to buy, sell, lease, mortgage, pledge and otherwise encumber real estate and personal property."

"FIFTH. There shall be no prescribed limit of the yearly income of the corporation from all sources, but the corporation shall not be operated for pecuniary profit."

"SEVENTH. The Board of Directors shall consist of nine Directors, who shall be elected in accordance with the By-Laws of the Corporation."

"NINTH. All persons who have been regularly initiated into the Nu Chapter of Alpha Chi Sigma Fraternity and who have ceased to be active members of Nu Chapter and all members of the Alpha Chi Sigma Fraternity who are members of the faculty of The Pennsylvania State College, shall be active members of this Alumni Association. All members of the Crescent Club who may be elected to membership in this Alumni Association by the Board of Directors in accordance with the By-Laws of the said Alumni Association of Nu Chapter of Alpha Chi Sigma Fraternity, shall be Associate members of said Alumni Association."

"THIRTEENTH. This Charter may be amended by a majority of the members voting therefor in person or by proxy at any meeting of the members of this corporation held for the purpose of changing the Charter and as to which date and the proposed change at least ten days written notice has been given to the members of the corporation."

The Articles of Incorporation have been filed in the Office of the Prothonotary of Centre County, Pennsylvania.
