phia school teachers, some who are members of the left wing Teachers Union, have circulated among the senators to discuss the bill with them.

"Many of the senators have not even read this bill," said a spokesman for the group. "Our aim is to bring it to their attention."

The oath, which Pecan wants all state employes to take reads: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the State of Pennsylvania against all enemies foreign and domestic, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same, that I take this obligation freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties upon which I am about to enter.

"And I do further swear (or affirm) that I do not advocate, nor am I a member of an affiliate of any organization, group or combination of persons that advocates the overthrow of the Government of the United States or of this State, by force or violence and that during such time as I am employed by (the name of municipality, etc.) I will not advocate, nor become a member nor an affiliate of any organization, group or combination that advocates the overthrow of the Government of the United States or of this State by force or violence."

Sen. William J. Lane (D-Washington) said he would insert a section to give all persons declared subversive a chance to appeal.

"Before a person or organization is declared subversive, a private hearing would be held before the attorney general to give the accused an opportunity to clear himself," Lane said.

Lane is co-sponsor of the amendments to define subversives and to adopt the civil defense workers oath as part of the proposed law and to include faculties of State-aided colleges and universities with regular State employes.

finest print showing this homely American custom.

Unfortunately the original painting has been lost. It is believed that Tait painted the scene from life and that the people portrayed were known to him. The lithograph from it was included in the best fifty Currier prints in the large folio size and appeared on the list of nine of the ten judges. These fifty prints were illustrated, described and published in 1934 by Harry Shaw Newman.

Another Currier & Ives print of the same subject but with different detail was published in small folio in 1872. Done from a painting by an unknown artist it ranks among the most desirable of its size. It is called "Maple Sugaring—Early Spring in the Northern Woods." This famous firm more than once used the same subject for the small and large folios but never the same scene.

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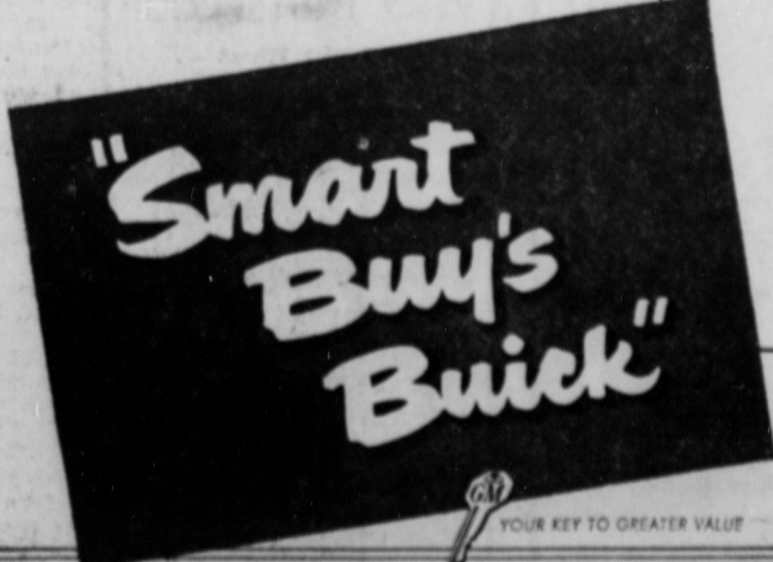
