 The borough police car, operated by Patrolman O. F. Brown, a car driven by LeRoy Sauer, Alpha fireman, and a parked car owned by William Speary, of Bellefonte RD, were involved.
 Damage was estimated at \$1500 to the police car, including the two-way radio set; \$100 to Sauer's car; \$500 to Speary's car, and about \$150 to a light standard.
