Recalls J. H. Shary

Dear Editor:

Here is another story for your paper. It is very true that out of the echoes of the past all of us old-timers can dig up a good story about J. H. Sharp, the magician and puppeteer. I don't think there ever was a man so gifted and so accomplished in such work, as he was and so widely known in person. A fine man, very common, and a good kind hearted man to be around. Mr. Sharp used to come to our town here in Moshannon when I was only a little boy and put on a good show for the Moshannonites. My father always gave him his supper and lodging and breakfast and that is why I am able to recall many things that he was able to do. I learned many tricks under his instructions, including the ventriloquism.

Although I never had a puppet until 1937, I got a very very small one I called Charley Smith which I later sold to another ventriloquist. I now have four puppets. I made a trip out to California, my wife and I and two of my talking puppets. We had a very nice time. I joined in a pet and doll show at a park in Reno, Nevada. Coming back I joined a carnival in Manchester, Ohio.

Before I got my puppets I used to play many tricks on people. Yes, I got a real thrill one night back in 1905 when by oldest brother got

married. The week they went to housekeeping in Clarence, my brother had to go away on some business. They hired a girl to work for them until they got started and I volunteered to help with the lifting. The first night after we went to bed, I couldn't let a good chance slip by to have some fun and it worked so good I didn't dare to say anything about it afterwards. A couple of years ago my brother's wife (Mrs. Nora Hazzard and her daughter from Tyrone) came to our place to hear the puppets. Then I asked her if she recalled the night that I carried on a conversation with a drunk man down at the front door. She said she did. She and the hired girl were badly scared. They carried a gun to bed for the rest of the week. When I told her that was only me throwing my voice we all had a good laugh.

But the greatest kick I ever got was when I bought my puppets and let on I couldn't use them. Then after a while the ventriloquist came to see me one time and thought I was doing pretty well. Yes, one has to be very clever to be able to throw his voice a distance as well as to use the short range with the puppets.

I also could give you a quarter or half dollar and take it away from you before you could get it in your pocket. Or I can stick my finger in a light socket and stick the bulb in my mouth and light it up. I can do quite a few other magic tricks that will mystify the onlooker. Now that I am retired I think that I will soon begin to show the people some of the things that I had hidden in my mind ever since J. H. Sharp was with us.

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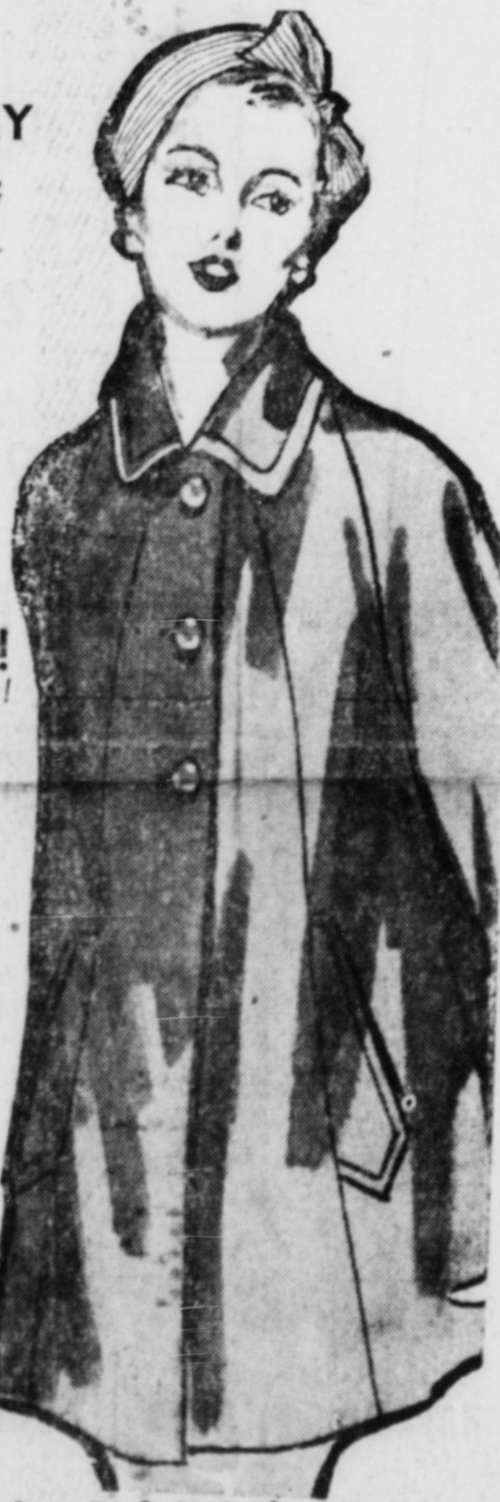
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
