

Aviation Cadets Receive Detailed Army Training

Extensive flight and technical training awaits local men who can qualify as Aviation Cadets," Sgt. Nagle of the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force, has announced.

He explained that the highly competitive U. S. Air Force Aviation Cadet program is available to single men between 20 and 26½, with a minimum of 90 college credits. Local applicants are forwarded to the Altoona headquarters of the recruiting service, where they are interviewed by the Aviation Cadet Procurement Officer, and given a five-hour mental examination.

The next phase of the qualification procedure, is conducted at the Olmsted Air Force Base, Middletown, where a thorough physical examination and qualification board interview is administered.

Successful applicants will enter the U. S. Air Force for assignment to cadet training. This includes approximately six months preliminary flight training, followed by a similar period of advanced training in the operation of the Air Force's many new planes. Security, full time employment and an opportunity for regular advancement, await the cadet who graduates from training as a second lieutenant, a commissioned pilot or navigator in the U. S. Air Force.

Provisions have been made to grant a four-month selective service deferment to the college student now attending college. This will allow the prospective cadet to complete the college semester, Sgt. Nagle pointed out.

Further details, including salary, allowances, insurance benefits and location of cadet training bases are available upon request, at the U. S. Army and U. S. Air Force Recruiting office in the Bush Arcade building, Bellefonte.

Farm Owners Served Now By Agency

Farm owners as well as tenants are now being served in the Farm Ownership program of the Farmers Home Administration, says Claude H. Myers, county supervisor, here.

Centre County farmers who own inadequate farms may make essential improvements on their land and buildings with Farm Development loans made or insured by this agency, Myers explained. Families unable to get suitable credit elsewhere may qualify. This credit is extended to improve farms that are large enough, but not well enough developed to enable the owner to make a good enough living. Funds may be used for basic soil conservation practices, drainage ditches, construction or repair of buildings, and other major improvements.

Repayment schedules are set up for 40-year periods, but borrowers may refinance their loans as soon as they can on satisfactory terms. The interest rate is 4 per cent. Myers pointed out that the greatest demand for Farm Development credit in Centre County is to construct or make improvements on house, barn and sheds, or other structures affecting the farm's efficiency.

In developing their farms, borrowers are encouraged to do as much of their own work as possible and use native materials whenever they can. He said the Farmers Home Administration cooperates in its Farm Development program with other agencies, including the State College of Agriculture, Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service and Forest Service.

"We can include funds in these development loans," he added, "to refinance indebtedness the farmer may have against his farm."

All applications go before the Centre County FHA Committee headed by Harry A. Corman, of Spring Mills, chairman. Other committee members are R. Nevin Lee, R. D. Howard, and Robert M. Harpster, Warriors Mark RD. This committee is responsible for deciding a farmer's eligibility for a loan and whether his farm can be developed into an efficient family type farm management unit within the legal investment limit of \$12,000 for Centre County.

Recommend Safer Blasting At Mine

An official coal mine reinspection report released recently by the U. S. Bureau of Mines, when re-examined in March by Inspector L. A. Ferry, shows the mine employed 4 men and averaged 15 tons of coal daily.

Black powder was used to blast coal and rock on shift, and the inspector recommended using permissible explosives or permissible blasting devices in an approved manner for all on-shift blasting.

Ferry proposed taking down or effectively supporting loose haulage-way roof on detection, offset installation, a fireproof housing and air duct and safety devices for the ventilating fan; making pre-shift and weekly examinations for gas and other hazards with permissible flame safety lamps, providing adequate haulage-way clearance space and shelter holes, and discontinuing using open-flame lights and smoking in the mine.

The inspector called attention to such established safety measures as using clay stemming, proper maintenance of haulage tracks and cars, providing suitable fire-fighting and first-aid facilities, and a well maintained escapeway.

Timely Reminders On Flower Gardens

Timely mid-April reminders on flowers and ornamental plantings for the home grounds are offered by Assistant County Agent Clair D. DeLong as follows:

Hedges may be desired for planting this year. Some desirable types of evergreens suitable for this purpose are various yews, such as Upright, Hatfield, Dwarf Japanese; and these evergreens—holly, hemlock, spruce, boxwood (either English or American), or others.

Among deciduous hedges are Dwarf Euonymus, privets, such as Iteadum, Itoha, Regal, Arumer; spiraea, such as Van Houtte, Korean, and the dwarf form of Anthony Waterer. All are good subjects. Most of these hedges can be grown formally or informally.

Look over your tools. Sharpen and oil the lawn mowers. Sharpen the planting tools. Get the rakes and spades in good condition.

Look over the bird houses. Make them habitable by painting and cleaning them.
