Grassland Field Day One of Five in State

Emphasis placed on good grassland farming practices at the district field day May 24 at Penn State, will be repeated at four such events for the benefit of farmers in all sections of the State, states County Agent L. H. Bull. The schedule for the other four: May 22, State Hospital farm, Wernersville, Berks County; May 29, Torrence State Hospital farm, Blairsville; June 1, Sordoni Sterling Farms, Harveys Lake, Luzerne County; June 5, County Home farm, Meadville, Crawford County. Each field day will embrace the whole section of the State in which it is located, taking in a dozen or more counties. Each will have an all-day program, starting at 10:00 a.m. and continuing through mid-afternoon. Programs are being planned for both men and women. Light lunches will be served on the grounds, although many persons probably will bring basket lunches. At each place are varietal trials of grasses and legumes planted in 1949 by research agronomists of the Agricultural Experimental State of Penn State. Representatives of the Station, which is working in conjunction with the Agricultural Extension Service in sponsoring the field days, will be on hand to explain these plots. Other features will include a variety of demonstrations and exhibits relating to different phases of good grassland programs. These will include modern machinery for making seedings, harvesting, ensiling and hay drying. A wood chipper will show how bedding, where straw may be in short supply, can be produced from waste wood and brush.

Airborne Training Offers Many Extras

"Extra training, extra pay, and extra adventure" are the keynotes of a career in the Airborne, with the U. S. Army, T. Sgt. William S. Nagle, of the local U. S. Army-Air Force Recruiting Station, comments. District men between the ages of 18 and 31, 60 and 78 inches tall, and weighing between 120 and 200 pounds, are eligible to volunteer for airborne training at the local station. Sgt. Nagle explained that paratroopers receive extensive training in all the weapons and equipment of the modern soldier, and in addition, learn to "jump" with some of this same equipment. To qualify, young men must complete the normal enlistment process, including mental, medical and moral requirements, basic training, and extensive paratrooper "jump" training. Airborne volunteers at this time begin their military career at Ford Meade, Maryland. Full details, including extra pay data, assignment information, and information concerning training, are available at the local recruiting station, Bush Arcade building in Bellefonte. (Continued From Page One) fairs of Centre County is the most important business within the county. It affects every person, old or young; it affects every business man, laborer and housewife. It is necessary for the County Commissioners to make important decisions relative to the financial affairs of the county involving maintenance of the county's property and the official conduct of all the county's business. As County Commissioner I have in the past endeavored to conduct the county's business in the same manner in which an individual conducts his own and I have endeavored to keep the county's expenses at a minimum and have insisted on the efficient, economical and prompt dispatch of all county business. Only if the County Commissioners do this do the taxpayers receive the full value for their tax dollar. Mr. Mensch further stated: "Evidence of the fact that this policy has been pursued by me is the record of the office of the County Commissioners during my incumbency. When I began my first term on Jan. 1, 1949, according to the Auditor's Report for the year 1939, there was an outstanding bonded indebtedness owing by the county of \$200,000, and unpaid bills of \$129,891.01. Against the Institution District the same Report shows a bonded indebtedness of \$17,990 and outstanding notes of \$41,500. During the time that I have been in office these obligations have been paid in full and an additional indebtedness of \$60,000.00 had to be financed in order to pay obligations which had been incurred prior to the time that I became a County Commissioner, and with the payment of which will be made this year, for which funds have already been provided, this indebtedness will have been paid in full and the county as well as the Institutional District will be completely free from debt, except for any that might be involved in current expenses. During this period of time the county property has been repaired and renovated and is today in the best shape that it has been for a great many years. This is evidence of what has been done in the past during the time I have been in office, and my constituents can be assured that if re-nominated and re-elected the same course of action will be pursued by me in the future."
