Two contests were necessary to select the regional winners in Public Speaking and Parliamentary Procedure. Two boys were selected as the speakers and seven boys to represent the top Parliamentary Team.

James Grove, of Gregg township, Centre County, was selected as the best speaker. "A miracle of Feeding Progress" was his topic. The second boy, who will also represent Region 3 is John Malloy, of Lewisburg. His topic was "Will You Be Next?" Honorable mention was given Glenn Love, of Juniata Joint School, and his topic was "Farm Records".

The Parliamentary Team selected to represent the region in June in Parliamentary Procedure was the Williamsport High School Team. Officers of this team are James Snyder, president; Thomas Driscoll vice-president; Robert Hiller, secretary; Jack Gephart, treasurer; James Alexander, reporter, and Glenn Harris, sentinel.

Dell assistant superintendent of schools, Huntingdon; Dr. Gilmore Warner State Teachers College, Lock Haven. Judges serving for Parliamentary Procedure were Dr. Russell B. Dickerson, vice-dean, School of Agriculture at Penn State; Edward Gilkey, graduate assistant in Speech at Penn State, Newcastle; and Emery Hildebrandt, graduate assistant in Speech, Penn State, Salem, Oregon.

Auto Club Urges Resistance To Increased Tax

Strong resistance by the motoring public to the proposed 20 per cent Federal excise taxes on new automobiles and an increase in the federal gasoline tax from 1.5 to 3 cents is urged by J. Maxwell Smith, president of Keystone Automobile Club in the 45th annual report of the club prepared for distribution among Keystone's 110,000 members.

"In my report last year," said Mr. Smith, "I expressed the hope for success in the long fight to lessen the heavy and unwarranted federal excise tax on the motorist. That, however, was before Korea and the swift-moving world events which have completely changed the domestic picture.

"Realistically, we cannot look for relief through lightening or abandonment of present taxes at a time of great national need. But we most certainly can, with justice, object to proposed excise tax increases as discrimination against the most heavily taxed class of any class of the citizenship. Keystone has joined with all other motoring agencies in resistance to a further increase in this form of taxation which, by reason of large registration, in relation to population, is especially severe in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland and the District of Columbia."

Boosting the tax from the present 7 per cent to 20 per cent, according to the club official, would increase the average new car cost from \$95 to \$265. With an increase in the federal gas tax, the combined levy on the motorist from these two sources would approach the billion-dollar mark. Even without the increases, the motorist pays approximately two billion dollars annually.

"Pennsylvania motor vehicle owners, for example," he continued, "last year paid in these taxes \$92,764,000. The return to the State in the form of Federal aid for highways was only \$23,866,000. If this great total in taxes could have been applied to Commonwealth road building, it would practically double the program estimated at \$114,000,000 this year from state taxes."
