Mr. Estright was born in Wingate Sept. 6, 1889, a son of Samuel and Hanna Lucas Estright. His father, who lives at Manor, survives.

His first wife, the former Grace Miller, died in 1916. His second wife, the former Annabelle Sprinkle, whom he married in 1929, survives.
