Mr. and Mrs. Charles Confer Jr., of Howard, were Sunday evening visitors at the Henry Vonada home.

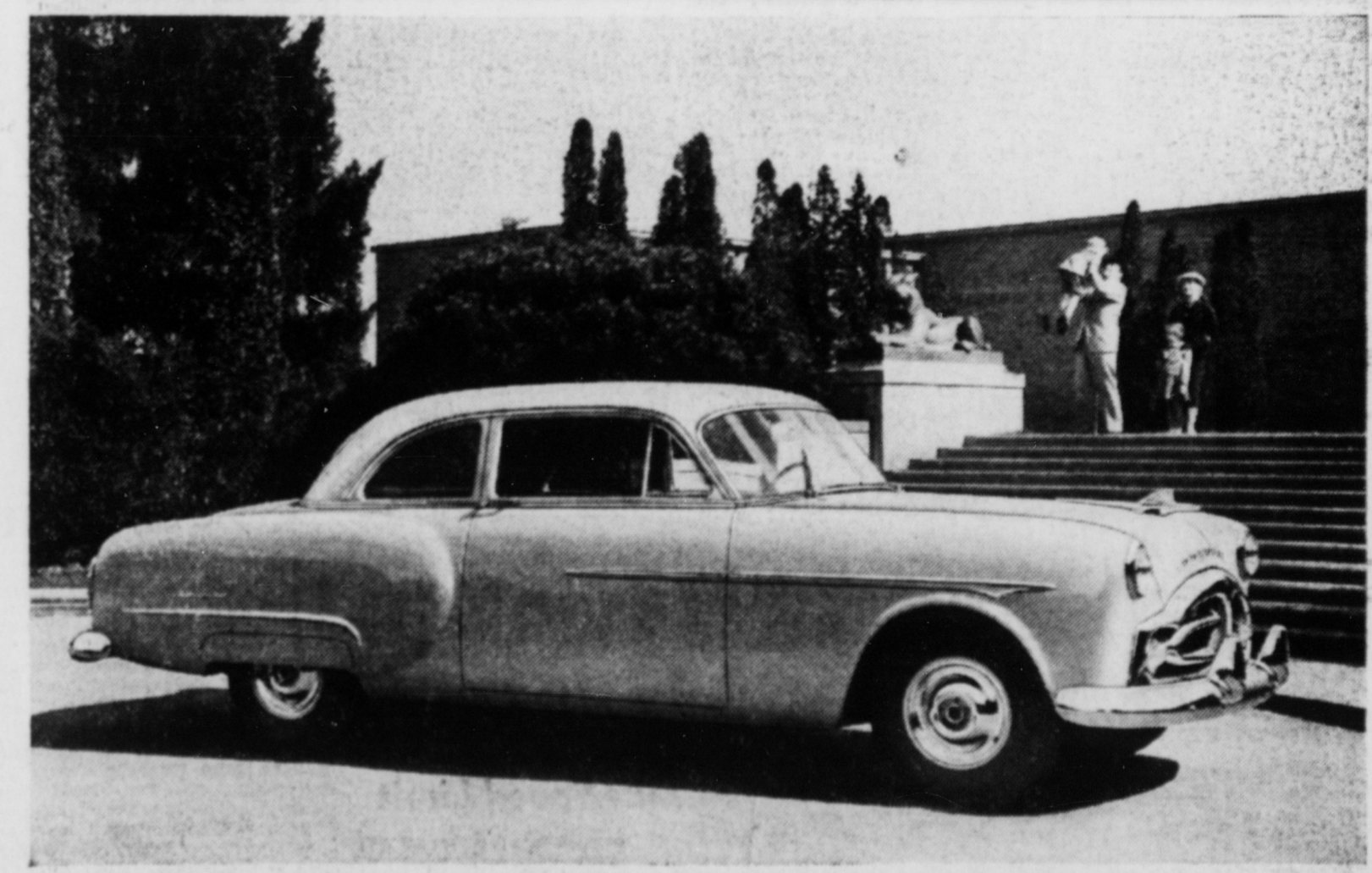
