George E. McClellan was re-elected vice president and general manager of the Bellefonte Central Railroad Company and other officers and directors were re-elected at the annual meeting last week.

In its annual report, the company said that the volume of business continued to increase during 1950 and that revenues reached an all-time high. They were 3.55 per cent higher than in 1949. The report stated that expenses increased 5.08 per cent. Rising wage rates and material costs accounted largely for the higher expenses, it was stated.

"In addition Handy Andy received in the way of a shower, many gifts similar to those received by many other babies. Among the gifts were found candy, chewing gum, writing paper, bobby pins, shaving cream, matches, cigarettes, etc.

"Handy Andy soon outgrew his quarters. It was then that the A & P store presented him with a cart all his own.

"Handy Andy has received the best of care from his foster mothers and members of the Auxiliary, Girl Scouts of Troop No. 12 and friends.

"He was soon recognized by the patients at the hospital as a very helpful and cheerful soul to the extent that the patients, like most people coming in contact with children, give advice as to how he should be reared. Fortunately, as yet, he has not become a problem child but has grown to the delight and satisfaction of all the patients of the hospital.

"Handy Andy has asked me to thank everyone of you for your time, gifts and services.

"He has also said, even though he is only five months old, that he will be a model child if you will assist him on his rounds at the hospital each Monday, Wednesday and Saturday between four and five o'clock.

"Handy Andy's legal guardians, Mrs. Jacob Friedman and myself, will greatly appreciate some new baby sitters.

In recognition of his outstanding 4-H achievement, particularly in leadership, Joseph Hartle Jr., of Bellefonte RD 1, has been selected as one of four Pennsylvania delegates to the National 4-H Camp, June 13 to 20, at Washington, D.C., according to announcement by County Agent L. H. Bull.

Now 18, Hartle has been in club work nine years with dairy calves, lambs and purebred swine for projects. He has exhibited his animals at his county fair and at the Pennsylvania Farm Show in Harrisburg. His 4-H projects have netted him an estimated \$2,500.

He was graduated in 1950, a top agricultural student in his class at Bellefonte High School. Active also in the Future Farmers of America, he was president of his chapter and won the Keystone Farmer degree. During Boys' and Girls' Week in Bellefonte last year, he was elected by his school as honorary mayor, and as an added honor was guest of the sponsoring Rotary Club at the district Rotary conference. Since graduation he has been employed as a dairy herd improvement association tester, but plans to relinquish his job to help his father operate their 149-acre farm.

His abilities as a leader developed gradually. Almost from the time he first became a member of 4-H, he has held a club office. He has served as president of his club and has been active in 4-H Camp, and in community affairs and church. He attended Leadership School and Club Week at Penn State. A member of the Grange, he recently was named to the Centre County (Grange) Fair committee—the first minor so honored—and also is assistant superintendent of the dairy cattle division.

Other Pennsylvania National 4-H Camp delegates are Esther F. Closen, 20, Bloomsburg, of Columbia county, a second year home economics student at Mansfield State Teachers College; J. Earle Yerkes, Jr., 19, of Pipersville, Bucks county, and Idalee Wells, 20, Belle Vernon, Westmoreland county. Their selections were made by the State 4-H Club staff at Penn State from nominations submitted by county agents in agriculture and home economics.
