# Wins Commendation

Cpl. Billy M. Young

Cpl. Billy M. Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. G. Young of W. High street, has been awarded a letter of commendation and ribbon by the Commanding General of the United States Marine Corps for his actions in the Inchon landing. Cpl. Young, a graduate of the Bellefonte High School in 1948, enlisted in the service a month after his graduation.

The letter follows: "For excellent service in the line of his profession while serving with a Marine combat service group during operations against the enemy in Korea on 15 and 16 September, 1950. Corporal Young, acting as message center man and runner, displayed great skill, ability and courage in the performance of his duties. During the amphibious assault at Inchon, Korea, he landed with the assault waves and immediately helped to set up and operate a message center. Subjected to heavy enemy fire, he made repeated trips to the various units locating command posts. He contributed materially to the success of the assault. He worked long and tedious hours showing no concern for his own personal safety or fatigue and his actions constantly set an example to all who observed him. Cpl. Young's conduct throughout was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

Cite Assistance Costs

Figures released by the Department of Public Assistance show that total public assistance costs during the month of April amounted to approximately \$11,000,000. The Federal government contributed \$4,246,000, or nearly 39 per cent, as its share of the month's costs, while the remaining \$6,754,000 came from State funds. Payment to Centre counties were \$45,717.60.
