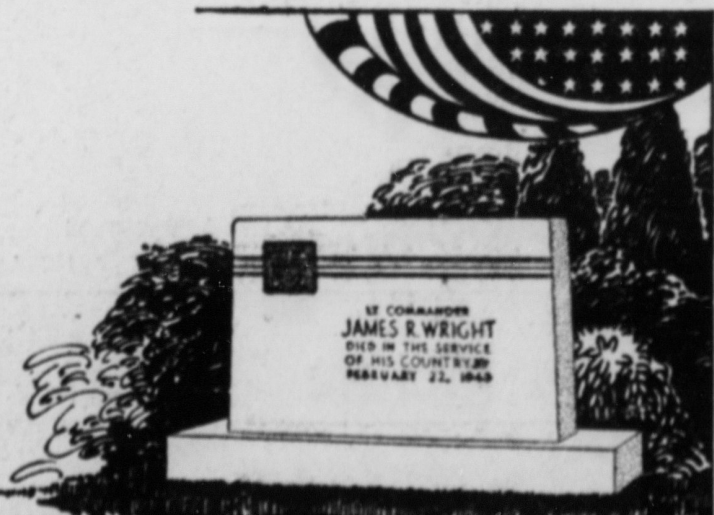

 friends of the Division in memory of Colonel Boal, and a large white cross ornamented with the Red Keystone, symbolic of the entire Division.  
 The large Shrine grounds, maintained throughout the year, were trimmed down and the memorials and plaques were polished for the impressive memorial ceremony.  
 Some 2000 veterans, their families, friends and distinguished guests gathered at the Shrine to participate in the beautiful and moving military rites which included placing wreaths on the several monuments on the grounds dedicated to the 4981 men of the Division who lost their lives in both World Wars.  
 The speaker of the day was Robert P. Snyder, World War II captain with the 21st Infantry Regiment, 28th Division.  
 Preceding his talk, the 104th Armored Cavalry Regiment of Tyrone, under Lt. R. J. Charles, passed in review while the State College American Legion Junior Drum and Bugle Corps played for the flag raising and "To The Colors".  
 The 553d Air National Guard band, Harrisburg, played "America" and the invocation was given by the Rev. Shadrach Jones, chaplain of the Society of the 28th Division. Clarence H. Miller, national commander of the society, spoke briefly, prior to a chorus by the Jaffa Temple Chanters from Altoona.  
 W. Charles Gallagher, of Wilkes-Barre, chairman of the Shrine memorial directorate, was in charge of the program.  
 Gallagher pointed out that the 28th Division Memorial Shrine through the efforts of the society and the State Department of Military Affairs, ranked second only to Valley Forge among the state's military memorials.  
 "The dignified grandeur and beauty of this 28th Division Memorial Shrine is entirely due to the efforts of the society and the unflinching cooperation and administration of General Weber, who, as adjutant general, has left nothing undone to make this one of the great war memorials in the country," said Gallagher.  
 Snyder, assistant to the president of Moravian College, Bethlehem, called for all veterans to unite behind the plan for universal training for American youths.  
 "We are the ones who know best how unpreparedness and lack of training costs lives," Snyder told the memorial throng.  
 "Our trouble is that because we hate fighting and killing, we oppose preparedness. It is up to us veterans to sell the value of military training to parents," he declared.  
 Following the speaker's outline of how veterans could push military training for young men, wreaths were placed on monuments by officers of the Society of the 28th Division and on unit crosses in a simulated cemetery during the roll call of honored dead. In the background the 553d band played "Roses of Picardy".  
 Maj. Gen. William G. Price, World War I commander of the 4th Division, emerged from retirement to join former officers and men of his old command in honoring the dead of the "Keystone Division".  
 Sharing the spotlight with General Price was Maj. Gen. Norman D. Cota, World War II commander of the Division, and Joseph McCracken, state commander of the American Legion.  
 McCracken, in a brief address, asserted that the country needs a foreign policy "eminently American in origin and concept."  
 "We cannot now foresee just how and for what we are going to be called on in the present emergency," the state Legion head said. "The President has called on the public for unshrinking thinking. The public is prepared to do this just as soon as it finds out where we are going."  
 Col. J. F. Kuhns, deputy adjutant general of Pennsylvania, introduced guests, including Charles R. Logan of the Ohio Veterans Association and Colonel Commander of the 82d Division Association, who expressed Ohio's sympathy to the families of the 33 members of the 109th Infantry who were killed en route to Camp Atterbury last year.  
 Colonel Kuhns represented Governor John S. Pine, and Maj. Gen. Frank A. Weber, state adjutant general, who was absent due to illness.  
 Veterans of the old Boalsburg Machine Gun Troop participated in the services, since the troop has moved its own shrine to the Shrine grounds.  
 J. Harris Holmes, of State College, who served with the old Troop, placed a wreath on the unit's new memorial at the Shrine entrance.  
 The State College American Legion Junior Drum and Bugle Corp. played Taps following the firing squad salute by the 104th Armored Cavalry Regiment, National Guard, from Tyrone.  
 While the rest of Centre County was dampened by showers, Boalsburg remained free of any down-pour and the sun shown intermittently throughout the ceremony—Divine intervention, perhaps.  
 Following conclusion of the services the 553d Band struck up "Old Soldiers Never Die".
