Sale of Building Fund New Superintendent **Bonds Explained at** Meeting

Sale of government bonds held by the Centre County Hospital Building Fund was announced at a meeting of the Board of Trustees Monday night, by S. Ward Gramley of Millheim, Finance committee chairman. Mr. Gramley said the bonds, with a par value of \$200,000 were sold at the market price of \$199,072. The Fund continues to hold \$75,000 worth of bonds that will mature in September.

In summarizing the steps taken with the bonds. Mr. Gramley told the group the Fund will net \$1,748 .-98 from the venture. The bonds were purchased originally so that he interest would defray pledge collection costs. The above figure epresents the amount gained after ledge collection costs of about \$10,000 have been deducted.
