Shortage In Burlap And Cotton Bags

Farmers can expect a shortage of burlap and cotton bags this year, warns Assistant County Agent Clair D. DeLong. Because of war demands, supplies of both burlap and cotton are tight. In addition, India has been shifting a large part of her burlap trade to Argentina in exchange for wheat.

By increased use, and more careful handling, bags now in use may be enough to meet the demand. You can help ease the situation by putting bags back into circulation through your feed dealer, states Mr. DeLong. Farmers are also urged to keep bags in clean, dry storage and not to rip bags open.
