

50 YEARS AGO: Bierly Brothers' Gasoline Runabout Tops 25 Miles An Hour in Speed Test

Bierly Brothers' Milesburg automobile came into town on Friday evening on a buzz and with a rush. On it were three persons, getting over the ground at the rate of about 25 miles an hour. The contraption was built by the Bierlys in their Milesburg shop. Gasoline was used to generate the power, and caused the buzzing when the auto was in motion. With electricity, instead of gasoline, the automobile would run with very little noise, but the electricity is not available there for that purpose. The carriage attracted considerable attention.

Senator Helmle more than surprised this community last week when the intelligence came from Harrisburg that he had secured the passage of a special bill in the Senate appropriating \$10,000 for the erection of a monument to the memory of Andrew G. Curtin, the famous War Governor of Pennsylvania. Senator Helmle paid a glowing tribute to the memory of the deceased and when the vote was taken at the conclusion of his remarks, there was not a dissenting voice. 20 YEARS AGO: Assistant Postmaster General Disperses Rumor That County Will Be By-Passed

Persistent rumors that the Post Office Department was considering the changing of the air mail route through Centre County have been denied by Second Assistant Postmaster General Glover, despite the many fatalities to air mail pilots. The recent crash of Pilot James Cleveland atop Nittany Mountain has furnished food for discussing the possibilities of abandoning the present route for the southern line which passes through Philadelphia, Harrisburg and Pittsburgh, but the postal official's statement dispels the idea. Cleveland was the 12 pilot to lose his life on the line in the state since its inception several years ago and the third to be killed on Nittany Mountain.

Bellefonte's famous exhibition of trout, that have furnished a thrill to thousands of tourists during the past few years, are about to be moved from their present location below the falls to the clear spring water above. The work will be done under direction of Hatchery officials sometime next week. Screens will be placed at certain points in the stream so that the trout will be unable to escape from the clear water along the sidewalk.
