College To Train **ROTC** Meteorologists

Air Force officers will be trained as weather forecasters in a postgraduate program to be instituted at Penn State in September, Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president, announced.

Under the plan, which will be directed by Dr. Hans Neuberger, chief of the division of meteorology at Penn State, the Air Force will send between 20 and 50 newly commissioned Air ROTC officers to the campus for this training. Dr. Neuberger explains that a

one-year course, which includes two regular semesters and the 1952 Summer Sessions, has been planned for the officers.

He describes the program as similar to that taken by undergraduates in meteorology during their junior and senior years in college The program, however, is accelerated and according to Dr. Neuberger, the schedule will be heavier than that carried by the undergraduates
