## Name Musicians For FFA Concert

Names of the 100 youthful musicians who will comprise the Pennsylvania Future Farmers of America Band were announced this week. This band, including players from 64 different high schools, will assemble and play for the annual FFA Activities Week at Penn State, June 13-15.

James Dunlop, director of Penn State's famous Blue Band and member of the College music faculty, has again been obtained to direct the 100-piece band. He directed last year's band which appeared as a feature of the 1951 State State Farm Show in January.

There will be concerts Wednesday and Thursday evenings and the final one Friday morning, each at a mass meeting of the FFA. This year FFA Activities are expected to attract about 1400 FFA delegates and members.

After breaking up at the end of the week, the musicians will not see each other again until next January when they re-assemble at Harrisburg to rehearse for the 1952 Farm Show program.

## College To Train ROTC Meteorologists

Air Force officers will be trained as weather forecasters in a post-graduate program to be instituted at Penn State in September, Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president, announced.

Under the plan, which will be directed by Dr. Han Neuberger, chief of the division of meteorology at Penn State, the Air Force will send between 20 and 50 newly commissioned Air ROTC officers to the campus for this training.

Dr. Neuberger explains that a one-year course, which includes two regular semesters and the 1952 Summer Sessions, has been planned for the officers.

He describes the program as similar to that taken by undergraduates in meteorology during their junior and senior years in college. The program, however, is accelerated and according to Dr. Neuberger, the schedule will be heavier than that carried by the undergraduates.

# Sell Off Roosters And Save On Feed

A saving of 40 to 50 cents a month at present feed prices can be made in the poultry feed bill for each mature rooster marketed, according to Assistant County Agent Clair D. DeLong. A rooster will eat about eight pound of feed a month.

Their presence in the flock is not necessary for the satisfactory production of market eggs. Actually, fertile eggs—those produced by a flock in which there are males, will not keep so well as infertile eggs.

Only those males which are good enough to use another year should be saved. The rest should be marketed immediately at the close of the breeding season. The breeding males saved should be given range away from the rest of the birds. When the males are first thrown together, there will be some fighting but on range they will have an opportunity to get away from each other.
