

HARRISBURG, January 9.-At the session of delphia, relative to judicial proceeding proposing changes to simplify the trial of cases

Mr. Brown, of York, introduced a bill for the protection of the public health by promoting growth and sale of healthy cattle, sheep and swine, making it a misdemeanor to sell the same without inspection before slaughter with-in the State, and to authorize courts and municipalities to appoint inspectors.

nicipalities to appoint inspectors.

Section 4-Be it enacted, etc, that it shall be unlawful to sell or offer or expose for sale in any township, city or borough of the Commonwealth beef, mutton, veal, iamb or pork for human food, except as herein provided, which has not been inspected alive within the State by an inspector or his deputy, duly appointed by the anthorities of said township, city or borough in which such beef, mutton, veal, iamb or pork is intended for consumption and found by such inspector to be pure, healthy and merchantable, and for every such offense the accused after conviction, shall be fined not more than 200 or imprisonment not more than 20 days; the said fines, when recovered, shall be paid to the proper County Treasurer for the use of the township, city or borough in which suit is brought.

Section 2-That the Board of County Commiserion 2-1134 the local of country communication cars is hereby empowered and required to apati in each township. In the proper country, one more inspectors and deputies, furnish the essary blanks, and decree the fees for such in-

necessary blanks, and decree the fees for such inspection.

Section 3—The townships, cities and boroughs of
the Common weatth are hereby authorized and required, within 60 days after the passage of this
act, to provide by ordinance for the appointment
of such inspectors and their deputies the proper
form of certificates to be given, and shall regulate
the fees to be charged, provided that where farmers saughter cattle, sheep or swine of their own
raising of feeding for human food, no other laspection shall be required or penalty enforced but
