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THE NEW DESTROYER. A Pneumatic Dynamic Gun Successfully Fully Stands the Official Test. ITS NEW AND PECULIAR FEATURES.

A Charge Which Would Instantly Annihilate a Man-of-War. FIRED WITH THE GREATEST ACCURACY.

Official tests made yesterday conclusively prove that a heavy dynamic charge, which would annihilate a man-of-war, has been successfully projected by means of compressed air. The guns are intended for the new United States cruiser Vesuvius. Some minor defects have to be remedied when the gun will again be tested.

NEW YORK, January 19.—An official test of the pneumatic dynamic gun, intended for the new United States cruiser Vesuvius, was made to-day at Fort Lafayette. Captain Zalinski conducted the experiments. They were not wholly satisfactory, but the failures were due, it is said, to an imperfection in the apparatus which is used in firing the charge.

A good many people interested in the gun and its object went down to the old dismantled fort at the mouth of the Narrows. Two or three days ago several naval officers, including the late Commodore M. C. Meade, made the target for the new gun. The marks were so placed that the space included in the target was the same as that of the course of a gradual climb and finally returns to the first subject, closing with an afterpiece of 44 shots.

The Government requisitions called for three guns on the Vesuvius of ten-inch bore, but in view of the fact that they also furnished a gun of ten-inch bore, the result was the explosion of a big charge of dynamite, the officers of the Pneumatic Gun Company determined to overstep the requisitions and furnish a gun of ten-inch bore. The experiments of yesterday were conducted with a view to testing the new gun.

It has been suggested to speak of this new feature in warfare as Captain Zalinski's gun, but as a matter of fact Captain Zalinski did not invent it. The first suggestion of a pneumatic dynamic gun was made by C. M. Ford, of Toledo. About five years ago he constructed a gun out of two-inch gas pipe which he fired with compressed air. He had a half dozen of these guns in his possession, and he has since then been working on them.
