

MARKETS STILL IN BUYER'S FAVOR

Light Receipts of Hogs and Prices Better Than Last Week.

HEAVY WEIGHT HOGS THE SLOWEST

OFFICE OF PITTSBURG DISPATCH, WEDNESDAY, February 20, 1889.

The run of local cattle on Monday was 85 ears, an excess of 20 loads over the previous Monday. Since the beginning of the week 6 to 8 cars have been added to the supplies. In the receipts were 10 loads of good shipping stock, though not extra, weighing 1,400 to 1,500 pounds. The bulk of the supplies were fair to good butcher stock. About 40 loads were from Ohio, the balance from Chicago. The best price realized was #4c. was for a very fine bunch weighing about 1,250 pounds each. The general range of prices was 3/4c to 3/4c, with anything above

this as exceptional. Heavyweight and high-priced cattle are not in demand. Butchers scare at anything above 4c, claiming that they cannot compete with dressed beef above this figure.

Drift of the Market. The whole drift of the cattle market has been downward since last fall, and the farmers who held their stock through the winter are losers to the extent of 2c per pound, not to speak of the cost and trouble of feeding. Good shipthe cost and trouble of feeding. Good snip-ping cattle soid this week at 4c which three menths ago would have brought 5%c.

The Ohio farmer, who is forced to accept \$25 or \$30 less on each steer than he could have taken last fall, can hardly be expected to feel very heavenly-minded over the situation.

A SPLIT ON PRICES How a Well-Known Pittsburg Gentleman Failed to Find a Tenant.

It not infrequently happens that owners of real estate in Pitttsburg complain that agents charge too much for securing purchasers or tenants. An instance in point occurred a day or two ago. A gentleman spplied to a Fourth street agent for a tenant for a house, the rental of which he fixed at \$800 a year. The agent said his charge would be \$15. The gentleman demurred to this and said he thought about \$2 50 would be enough. Of course this prevented a bargain. This circumstance led to a brief comparison of Pittsburg prices with those of Chicago, Philadelphia and New York." In business matters they are not disposed to wait for the slow process of natural selection or the fitful action of private enterprise. A bill was introduced in the Wisconsin Assembly last week providing for an appropriation of \$15,000 to establish and maintain a station, with the necessary mulberry orchards, etc., to give a thorough trial of the practicability of silk culture in that State. In the same week a bill was passed by the Kansas House of Representatives to encourage the manufacture of sugar in that State by enabling municipalities to vote bonds to aid in the construction of sugar factories. Any city of the second class is to be permitted to subscribe not over \$20,000, and any city of the third class, or township, or

village, \$10,000. The voters are to pass upon the question at any general or special election. Small beginnings in business affairs often lead to fortune.
