

HE DEFIES THE BULL.

Chairman Andrews Seizes the Rampant Animal by the Horns and DEMANDS A FULL INVESTIGATION. Premier Appropriations for Charitable Institutions. A NECESSITY FOR MANUAL TRAINING.

Chairman Andrews refuses to rest under the imputation that he appropriated \$45,000 which he was to use to secure legislative votes. He demands that the charge, or rumor, rather, be investigated, and a committee has been appointed for that purpose.

PRIVILEGED MANUFACTURERS. Certain Classes Exempted From the Provisions of the Three-Mill Tax. (SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.) HARRISBURG, February 27.—A favorable recommendation was made to-day on the new revenue bill with an amendment providing that corporations, limited partnerships and joint stock associations, chartered or organized for the manufacture of iron or steel, cotton or woolen goods, or exclusive privilege in such manufacture, shall be exempt from the three-mill tax on capital stock.

This section creates in the State Department at Washington a registration division for the registration of all persons hereafter naturalized, and makes such registration essential to the validity of such naturalization.
