

LOVE'S TRAGIC END. An Elopement, Murder and Suicide Follow in Quick Succession. WALKED 11 MILES IN THE MUD Only to Take Their Own Lives at the End of the Journey.

A HANDSOME GIRL OF SIXTEEN YEARS Flees From Her Home to Meet at the Same Time Her Lover and Death.

An Illinois community has been shocked by a startling tragedy. A young couple eloped together, walked 11 miles through mud and water, and ended their lives after reaching their destination.

PAW PAW, Ill., March 7.—An elopement which this community has witnessed last Monday morning has ended in a tragedy as horrible and shocking as any that the place can remember for years.

At 10 o'clock on Sunday night the girl's mother saw her go out the back door of the house and disappear into the darkness.

The little traveler had stumbled and staggered from exhaustion on the track. It now seems that the young couple reached a farmhouse about six miles southeast of Earlville Tuesday night and applied for shelter.

McLaughlin and the girl were both dead. The young man had evidently put the weapon back of the girl's ear and had let it into her head.
