One of the Most Prominent Pittsburgh Shippers Suspected of UNDERBILLING A FIRM'S FREIGHT.

The Mississippi River Rates Withdrawn by Nearly All Roads.

WINDRIM WHO BUILT OLD UNION DEPOT There is more trouble among the railroads of this city over the inter-State commerce amendment, or rather because of its enforcement. Yesterday the Pittsburgh and Western Railroad withdrew all its Mississippi river through tariff, thereby following the example of the Pennsylvania Company, which withdrew them on the 19th inst.

The withdrawal of the through rates makes an advance on business destined to all points on the Missouri river and beyond, which has been taking the Mississippi river rates. The advance is from 15c to 20 cents per 100 pounds, and means hundreds and thousands of dollars to shippers. The Baltimore and Ohio and Lake Erie roads have not yet withdrawn the rates; but it is only a question of time until they do. Several of the other roads, however, company say they will publish the rates, and if it is found necessary to withdraw them, they will comply with that part of the law by giving ten days' notice of the withdrawal. The publication of the rates, which must necessarily include all the stations in the Missouri river territory, will be a great expense to the companies, and it is something that had never been tried before.

AFRAID OF FIGHTING WRONG. The object of withdrawing the rates is to keep on the safe side of the law, and not run the risk of fine and imprisonment. For a long time past it has been the custom for shippers to be furnished through rates and through bills of lading. In computing through rates it is extremely difficult to avoid violating the "long and short haul" section of the inter-State law. For instance, in making a through rate from Pittsburgh to Omaha, the proportion 1/2 of the through rate West of the river will be found to be less than the strictly local rate. Many railroads object to this, as a violation of the law, while just as many say that it is not. The enforcement of this law is a matter of which the Western officials turned it over to their solicitors, who advised them that to be on the safe side of the law, they should withdraw the rates. The rates are being withdrawn, and the matter will be that they will get all the business and following cases in the inter-State trade and call a ball.

The following case was brought to the attention of the railroad agents yesterday: A firm doing business on the Southside had a cargo of iron which they wanted shipped to a small station that took the Omaha rate. They wanted to go via Chicago and Lake Erie, and the company would not issue a rate beyond that point.

THE EXACT DIFFERENCE. The tariff to Chicago is 15 cents, and beyond 25 cents per 100 pounds. This makes the through rate 40 cents. The Baltimore and Ohio line offered to take the cargo to a small station that took the Omaha rate. They wanted to go via Chicago and Lake Erie, and the company would not issue a rate beyond that point.

READY TO MAKE AN EXAMPLE. One of the Western agents has his eye on a fine in this city that has in contemplation the shipment of a carload of stuff, in which case, if they misrepresent it, the matter will be reported to the inter-State commission, which will issue a fine of \$100. The former testimony will be submitted to the inter-State commission, and it is anticipated that a fine of \$100 will be levied against the company.
