

HOME BEER IMPURE

According to Judge White's Idea, Expressed from the Bench. LAST OF THE LICENSE HEARINGS. The Jug Trade Not Unlawful, Though it May be a Great Nuisance. A COURT'S OPINION OF SALOON SAINTS

In the last day's session of the License Court, Judge White hurriedly went over the cases. As the last applicant passed away from the stand his Honor breathed a deep sigh of relief. The Court once more stated, in answer to inquiry from attorneys, that it was almost impossible to give out the decision on the list of applications before next Monday.

Shortly after the opening of the morning session Judge White, in speaking of beer, said he was not the hidebound man some people asserted. When he first came to Pittsburgh he drank a glass of beer at his noon lunch, and he found it did not agree with him. He had drunk beer in Germany and discovered it was a different drink. He did not think there was any pure beer made in America.

P. J. Brennan, Bradnock, was the first applicant heard, and passed easily. Morris Rosenbloom had no trouble, and Jacob Friedman put in a letter of recommendation from Captain Jones, of the steel works. M. J. Hughes wants a license to use the building formerly occupied by Pier 6 Danalls as a warehouse. He showed that the Pittsburgh dealers could not ship by the barrel and make money, and that he would use the building to sell while by car lots the rate is 20 cents. Nicholas Schafer, the last Bradnock applicant, wants his brewery license renewed.

Henry Charters, James Schaefer, Henry Hanna and Nicholas Schreiber were new applicants. D. Lutz & Son asked for a warehouse license. The Court said the firm could use their building as a warehouse, but could not sell it.

George Ganster, who was refused last year, opened the Etna borough list. Michael Metzgar has a brewery. His sales in Etna and Schuylburg are a pretty good business. Lutz & Co. were down for a branch at Homestead, but then Charters having covered it, the firm agreed to sell only in original packages of not less than six gallons. Peter Schmitt and Charles Schulz were new applicants.

MILLVALE AND McKEESPOT. Ems & Schaefer, of Millvale borough, own the Willow Grove Brewery, and did a business of \$60,000 last year. The Bannerman Brewing Company asks for a bottling license only in Millvale, their brewery being in Shaler township. The bottling business last year reached \$13,000.

A. P. Ferguson, Henderson & Weiland, Jacob Weiskircher, Abraham Johnston and Frederick H. Busche, all of McKeespote, were refused licenses last year, but had special request in addition to lots of faith, to apply once more.

Henry D. Emsbaugh, of McKeespote, had a wholesale license, but handled only beer. His receipts last year were \$11,000. He handles the Cincinnati, Wheeling and Pittsburgh beer. He disposed of about 1,000 cases of bottled beer. His principal trade was with private families. He also handled the Bannerman and Emsbaugh brands for a bottling license only in Millvale, and furnished the Court with a statement of the time when they quit selling to them.

Thomas Moore, McKeespote, has a distillery which he sold for \$10,000 and \$100,000 retail. He moved selling in jugs and sometimes in buckets to women. He also stated that some temperance people came to his place after eight and bought jugs, which caused the Court to inquire and remark: "You never had a jug trade before, while it is not unlawful, it may be considered a very great nuisance."

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE RATE OF EASY STREET, from Craft Avenue to Halket Street. WHEREAS, it is ordained and enacted by the city of Pittsburgh, in Select and Common Councils assembled, and it is hereby ordained and enacted, that the grade of Easy Street from Craft Avenue to Halket Street, be and the same is hereby established as follows: Beginning at the east curb line of Craft Avenue at the intersection of the same with the falling of the rate of 1 foot per 100 feet for a distance of 24 1/2 feet to a point on curve at an elevation of 214 4/8 feet, thence by a convex vertical curve for a distance of 100 feet at an elevation of 214 4/8 feet, then falling at the rate of 4 feet per 100 feet for a distance of 40 1/2 feet to the west curb line of Halket Street at an elevation of 191 25/100 feet.
