GREAT PLANS AHEAD.

The New Public Safety Chairman Speaking of Big Things.

A KEAR OF IMPORTANT OUTLOOK.

Snags Encountered at the Outset Regarding New Buildings.

PROPOSED FIRE AND POLICE STATIONS

The new Committee on Public Safety organized yesterday afternoon in Select Council Chamber, and unanimously elected Mr. John S. Lambie chairman. Mr. Lam bie made a nest little speech, acknowledging the honor, and in referring to the re sponsibilities resting upon the committee. said that within the next year it would be asked to pass upon several measures of great public importance.

By unanimous consent the regular meeting days of the committee were fixed for the first Monday of each month.

Two ordinances were read by the clerk one authorizing the Chief of the Depart ment of Public Safety to purchase a lot of ground near the intersection of Brownsville and Arlington avenues, Thirty-first ward, for the use of the Bureau, of Fire, restricting the cost to \$3,000, and one authorizing him to locate and equip a hose and fire engine company in the Thirty-first ward. The ordinance first named was submitted by Mr. Binder, and the other by Mr. Nis

Mr. Ferguson objected to fixing the price on the lot at \$3,000. He said the city had been paying very extravagant prices for such sites lately, and while he did not know whether he was right or not, \$3,000 seemed to him a very steep figure for a lot on top of the Southside hills.

Mr. Ruhlandt moved to recommend Mr. Binder's ordinance, but Mr. Nisbet moved to amend by substituting his ordinance, his idea being that if Chief Brown was authorized to locate and equip an engine company there, he would have sufficient license to buy, too, and he was anxious that fire protection be supplied to the Thirty-first ward

ms soon as possible.

Mr. Ruhlandt thought that a fire engine could not be used in the Thirty-first ward, if they had it, unless the streets should be paved very soon, and anyhow the appro-priation made for that purpose would not admit of equipping a company this year. Mr. Nesbit then moved that both ordinances be recommended; but the motion was defeated, and Mr. Binder's ordinance was recommended, while that of Mr. Nesbit was laid over until next meeting. When the ordinance authorizing the erec-tion of a new police station on the site of the

one in the Thirty-sixth ward was read, Mr. Ferguson again objected. He thought the ordinance was too open, and would give too much license, which would result in the erection of another \$30,000 building such as they had in the Nineteenth ward. The ordinance, as read, authorized the Department of Public Safety to have pians and specifications made and to advertise for proposals and construct the building without consulting anybody. There was a time, he said, when the department submitted plans and specifications of any proposed building to the proper committee; but he supposed that since they got nipped on the Seventeenth ward station and were compelled to curtail extravagances on that account, they did not want to get nipped again. He did not believe in giving such unlimited power to the department, and moved that, before further action was taken on the ordinance, the plans and specifications of the proposed building be presented to the committee, and to that end that the ordinance be laid over until the next meeting, which was agreed to. Chief Brown, when told of this decision,

said that an appropriation of \$11,000 had been specially made for the new Thirty-sixth ward station, and that amount would be needed. He did not see how he could have a plan of the building made before he was authorized to build it.

Reopening the Good Old Question.

An ordinance was passed by City Councils in 1876 for the opening of Forbes street from Boyd street to Fifth avenue. In 1884 views were made to carry out the project. Then it was dropped. To connect Forber street with Diamond street, as is now proposed, will reopen the old question. appropriation was once made for the first named work, but the money was, of course,

Potato Green bridge, Marshall, \$2,100. To-tal, eight bridges, \$23,900.

Commissioner McKee voted against the plans for the bridges named, stating that he believed rough-faced stone work was good enough, and the fancy work and dressed stone were not necessary, in addition to which the extensive cost of these bridges prevented the erection of necessary bridges

in other districts.

Notwithstanding this opposition, the building of the bridges was approved.
