The telegraph offices were crowded with people all day, trying to learn news of friends who were living in the town which has almost been washed from the face of the earth. Two traveling men who were in one of the hotels that was swept away arrived here by foot to-day, and toll a wonderful story of their narrow escapes. Several persons who left Bedford early yesteriaxy for Johnstown have just returned from the scene of the disaster, and from their own observations they put the loss of life at \$,000. Several families from this county who were visiting friends there are known to be lost. The wife and daughter of H. B. Aarsn, of Loyaburg, and a family by the name of Replogle have been drowned. The bodies were recovered and are now at Rockwood, and will be brought to Bedford to-morrow. About 30 residents of Bedford who were supposed to have been lost have since been reported as saved. Superintendont Myers, of the Hedford Division, sent a gang of men out this afternoon to get a line to Altoona.

TWO DAYS ON A ROOF.

The Experience of Superintendent Clark's Wife-The Watt Family Safe. IFROM A STAFF CORRESPONDENT.1

JOHNSTOWN, June 2.- That the people in the afflicted districts do not yet appreciate all the horrors of their situation is manifest. They are dazed from the suddenness of the shock, and the reason of many is tottering on the throne. Husbands speak of the loss of heir wives without a tear. Mothers relate how their beloved children were swept from them as if the occurrences were of an ordinary charactet. Many who have lost their all tell of it with apparent zest, as though it were some-thing to boast of and be proud of.

The flood of water has given place to the flood of excitement, and when it is succeeded by the calm that must surely follow, then, and then alone, will the sense of bereavement, great

then alone, will the sense of bereavement, great and deep, reign supreme.

Upon the hill above Johnstown, this afternoon, I came across two ladies and a little boy. The former were gazing vacantly about the ruins of what had once been their happy home, while the little one was prattling away as he played amid the sands. The elder of the two was Mrs. Clark, wife of Superintendent Clark, of the Cambria Iron Company. Her residence was an Main street, and with her little family are little for two days upon the roof of the house, only aller resident from her horrible position to-day. Her sister, who lived at Woodvale, with her two children, succumbed to the flood.


