

THE CROWN TRAGEDY

Alexander Sullivan's Secrets Are to Be Given to the Grand Jury.

PRIVATE TELEGRAMS EXAMINED.

A Host of Witnesses Are Called Upon to Give Their Evidence.

FATHER DORNEY PLACED IN THE BOX

CHICAGO, June 18.—The sensational incident of the Crown grand jury this morning was the refusal of William E. Bell, of the Western Union Telegraph Company, to obey an order of the jury to produce messages passing between Alexander Sullivan, Dan Conghlin, P. O'Sullivan, John J. Moraney and G. W. Melville. Mr. Bell maintained that it was against the rules of the company to produce such messages, and that the statutes of the State of Illinois imposed a fine of \$5,000 upon a telegraph company for disclosing the contents of any personal or business message passing over its lines.

After all attempts to induce the witness to obey had failed, the jury, headed by Judge Sheppards, returned to the courtroom. His Honor issued an order directing the witness to answer under pain of contempt and commitment. Charles S. Holt, attorney for the Western Union, appeared in behalf of the witness, and stated that while the company desired in every way to assist the ends of justice, it did not desire to voluntarily violate the statutes of the State and disclose the messages of its patrons upon the mere request of a grand jury.

THEY WOULD SUBMIT. If the Court thought fit to issue an order directing the witness under pain of contempt to produce the messages the company would then consider this a bar to any possible civil prosecution by patron and the witness would obey the order. He thought, though, the jury should more explicitly describe the messages wanted, their present request being more in the nature of a general demand. State Attorney Longenecker held that the jury could not directly describe the contents of messages sent.

What the jury wanted was the right to examine all and any messages that might have passed between any of the suspected parties since March 1. The jury alone could be the judge of their relevancy to the case. Mr. Holt objected somewhat to an order of such sweeping character, but the judge fully sustained the State Attorney and an order was spread upon the record directing the witness under pain of contempt and commitment to produce any and all messages, cablegrams, or copies thereof in the Chicago office passing between Alexander Sullivan, Dan Conghlin, P. O'Sullivan, John J. Moraney and G. W. Melville and Charles McDonald, either under their true name or any alias, or between either of these men and any other person or persons, since the first of March last.

AFTER THE MESSAGES. The officers of the Western Union stated that five men employed by two clerks were searching among the records for originals or copies of the messages desired, and that they would now be promptly spread before the jury. Maurice Morris, a friend of Dr. Cronin, was before the jury this morning and told how the doctor had frequently stated that he had incurred the enmity of certain persons high in authority in Irish societies and that he had feared for his life.

William Mulcahy, the suspect about whom so much has been written, was closeted with the jury for an hour and those who heard his story became convinced that he had no connection with the crime. He showed that he had not gone to work for O'Sullivan until several days after the date of the murder, and from his evidence, did not appear to know much about O'Sullivan or his associates. He was asked particularly about the movements of O'Sullivan during the days following the murder, but stated that they were in no wise suspicious and that O'Sullivan seemed to be devoting more time to the ice business than any other outside affair.

He stated that he had never, to his knowledge, seen O'Sullivan and Conghlin together during those times and that he might possibly be mistaken on that point, as he was not well acquainted with Conghlin. Altogether Mr. Mulcahy was a very unprofitable witness, and the jury obtained no information of consequence from his cross-examination.

NOT MUCH INFORMATION. Fifteen or 20 witnesses were before the grand jury this afternoon, but by far the greater number were singularly devoid of information. Robert Boyington, Pat Brennan and James Minchin, all employees of Loman O'Sullivan, testified to the habits and demeanor of their employer about the time and previous to the murder, and were particularly questioned as to his relations with Conghlin and Woodruff. They knew nothing of O'Sullivan's intimacy with Conghlin, and all testified that they had never seen Woodruff, either at the icehouse or any place else.

Maloney, the saloon keeper, told about the row in his place between ex-officer Roach on one side and Conghlin and Sullivan on the other; and Roach was called and corroborated this story, and otherwise testified to the intimacy between Conghlin and the ice man.

The Carisons were again called to testify as to certain incidents in connection with the renting and occupancy of the cottage and were given another chance to identify the picture of Martin Burke, the man William who rented the cottage. They did not appear any more certain of his identity than yesterday, and the jury was told to return an indictment against Burke without additional evidence. In this the jurors failed to agree with Chief Hubbard, who appeared before the jury and urged the prompt indictment of Burke.

SULLIVAN'S FRIENDS. Henry Stollenberg, Alexander Sullivan's clerk, was questioned at length regarding the alleged intimacy between the Irish renter and Dan Conghlin, but failed to fulfill the expectation of the jury. He knew nothing of Conghlin's calls at the lawyer's office, but admitted that the former might have entered Sullivan's private room without being observed by the renter of the firm.

Mrs. Rich, who lives on Ashland avenue, Cligonally across from the Carison cottage, was called upon to describe the people whom she observed at different times entering the cottage and loitering around the ice-house, but she failed to describe any one who bore accurate resemblance to Burke, and was unable to identify his photograph as that of any one she had ever seen.

Thomas Given, an employe of the department, testified that he had seen Burke during the latter's recent residence in the city, but had no knowledge of his intimacy with O'Sullivan, Conghlin or any other of the suspected persons. T. J. Conroy, the juror that he was intimately acquainted with Dr. Cronin during his life time, and that the latter had frequently expressed the conviction that his life was in jeopardy and that he was liable to be murdered at any time by emissaries of prominent Irish leaders.

THEY DID THE SECRETS. Conroy also stated that he was a member of the Riverside Camp of the Clan-na-Gael and had heard John F. Beggs' speech denouncing Cronin. John F. Beggs himself was next called upon by the jury, but his evidence contained nothing new and was substantially a repetition of his testimony of yesterday.

E. G. Dunne, William J. Hyatt's law partner, was on the stand a few minutes, but failed to relate anything that deserved the dignity of testimony and was followed by James Quinn, the Clerk street hatter, who again testified to certain incidents indi-
