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CHICAGO'S AMBITION

They Are Bound to Have the World's Fair if Work Will Get It. CHICAGO, August 1.—The Chicago World's Fair committee held a meeting this afternoon to decide ways and means of securing the coveted location of the World's Fair at Chicago.

RECEIVED

Resolved, That whereas the recent Centennial celebration in New York received very properly and with Chicago's hearty concurrence—the distinct recognition of Congress, and of the chief officers of the Government, imparting to it a national character, and a like recognition and substantial aid having been extended to the World's Fair in Philadelphia—also with Chicago's cordial co-operation in and out of Congress—therefore the West feels justified in insisting upon its turn now, and upon the location of the next great fair in its commercial metropolis.

AN EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Governor Fisher and Senator Callahan were added to the General Committee, and the Mayor was also authorized to add to the General Committee representatives of the cities of the Western and Northwestern States in the ratio of not exceeding one for each 10,000 population.
