The Methodist Episcopal Church Will Organize a New Society TO HELP EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS.

BISHOP FOSS WILL ACT AS PRESIDENT

It is to promote and provide funds for the advancement of higher education in the Pittsburgh Conference.

There are only two colleges in the Pittsburgh Conference, and these are for females. It is expected that the incorporation of this society will greatly benefit these institutions.

On May 31, when the train they were on, the ill-fated day express, had reached Conemaugh, two miles east of Johnstown, the railroad officials, so he alleges, got notice of the danger from the flood and the anticipated bursting of the South Fork dam.
