The entire argument was made by Colonel Moore, and at its conclusion Justice Clark took the papers and retired to a private room. After an absence of 15 minutes he returned and granted the writ prayed for, and gave an order for the release of the convicted Addrimes, placing the bail at \$2,000 cach. It was Colonel Moore's intention to have the order taken to Prothonotary Newmyer and have him issue the writ immediately, but in the confusion Mr. McGirr, who is in Colonel Moore's office, locked the papers up in his desk and then went away. Thus it was that the aidermen had to spend an entire extra night in jall. The course of procedure now is to have the writ issued by Prothonotary Newmyer, then have the prisoners brought into Criminal Cont and released on ball pending the argument of the case before the Supreme Court.




