EXPENSE OF STATE INSTITUTIONS.

Interesting Facts Reported by the Auditor General and the Governor.

The expenses of the State of Pennsylvania last year aggregated \$8,182,147, an increase of nearly \$800,000 over the previous year.

the Auditor General's report.

ISPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATOR. HARRISBURG, December 18 .- The Auditor General's report, giving the summary of receipts and expenditures for the last fiscal year, has some interesting facts relative to the State finances. The year previous the aggregate revenues were \$8,694,060 42, which sum is \$228,661 20 more than the past year. The tax on corporation stock and limited partnerships is sunually increasing, reaching \$1,952,771 54 the past year, as against \$1,814,848 73. The tax on gross receipts of corporations was decreased from \$583,556 71 to \$517,256 34. The tax on gross premiums was increased from \$42,943 60 to \$49,906 64; on the stock of banks, safe deposit and trust \$1,814,848 73. The tax on gross receipts of on the stock of banks, safe deposit and trust companies, from \$456,102 76 to \$469,900 82; on county and municipal loans, from \$116,-836 91 to \$144,788 79, and on loans of priwate corporations from \$33,405 57 to \$103,-

PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX.

The tax on net earnings, or income, was reduced from \$88,009 52 to \$71,668 19. The tax on personal property dropped from \$1,614,823 20 to \$747,871 32, while that on \$1,014,823 20 to \$747,871 32, while that on cellateral inheritance jumped from \$738,433 11 (which was an unusually large amount) to \$1,378,453 71. This coormous increase is due to the death of the millionaires, Dubols, of Clearfield, and Williamson, of Philadelphia.

Foreign insurance companies paid into the State Treasury \$674,346 25, as against \$425, 516 41. The revenue derived from retail liquor dealers was decreased from \$348,855 49 to \$310, 142 56, and from wholesale dealers from \$200, 142 56, and from \$37,933 40 to \$58,937 75, and the bottlers from \$77,772 34 to \$58,937 56. The licenses, in the aggregate, have increased from

The tax on writs, with sheeds, etc., is \$155,258 21, as against \$149,288 75. The bonus paid by expectations on charters aggregate \$164,561 30, an increase of \$152 72. The commissions of notaries public realized for the State \$8,325 at \$25 each, against \$11,053. The fees secured public officers have in-creased from \$64,589 67 to \$83,079. The connei-ence fund reached \$302, an increase of \$221.45. Items under the head of "miscellaneous" the

past year amounted to only \$32,096 77, while the previous year they aggregated \$1,274,221 60. Among the new items was the som of \$366,768 82 pand the State by the Allegheny Valley Railroad Company.


