MOURNING FOR THEIR SON.

Impressive Celebration of the Anniversary of Prince Rodolph's Death.

LONDON, February 1.—The Emperor and Empress of Austria have been in mourning this week, and both observed Thursday, the first anniversary of their son Rodolph's suicide, as sacred. The ladies chieftain at Meyerling, in which the tragedy took place, has been transformed into a monastery, and the wing in which Rodolph died is now a chapel, the altar of which stands where the Prince's bed once stood.

GERMAN WORKMEN PLEASED.

They Like the Appointment of Freiherr Berlepsch to Succeed Bismarck.

LONDON, February 1.—Workmen in Germany are much gratified at the Emperor's selection of Freiherr Berlepsch as Minister of Commerce and Industry in succession to Prince Bismarck, resigned. The new Minister, during the great coal strikes in the Rhine districts, last summer, proved a good friend to the poor miners, and was almost their only champion in high places.

TOOLE IN GREAT DEMAND.

A Meal of Some Kind for Him Every Hour in the Day.

LONDON, February 1.—When Toole sells for Australia the last of the month he will be in the condition of an artificially fattened goose—provided he lives to eat it all. Since his return from the provinces the popular comedian has had scarcely a day without alibantary entertainment of some sort, either breakfast, luncheon, dinner or supper, with often two or three or four. This week he was dined by the Campbell, Prasad and Garrick, Arundel, Savage and Ross families.

A RACE AND A BRIDE WON.

Romantic Betrothal of a Millionaire's Daughter From a Covent.

NEW YORK, February 1.—The marriage of Miss Mary B. Hoyt, the daughter of Millionaire Robert Hoyt, of Shrewsbury, N. J., to Charles W. Billings, of Hoboken, which took place before Justice of the Peace Seymour at Hoboken, on Thursday, revealed a charming little romance. Mr. Billings, who is 25 years of age, is the owner of Count Luna, leader and owner of racing horses, and has been very successful. His horse Leander won on Thursday from a field of good horses, although Mr. Billings was not present. A trusted agent placed a good many bets for Mr. Billings, who remarked as he gave him the money: "I ought to be a good day for Leander to win, as it is my wedding day."

IN SPITE OF NINE DOCTORS.

The Young Spanish King's Recovery is Now Thought Assured.

LONDON, February 1.—The Spaniards have not yet ceased celebrating King Alfonso's recovery, which, in view of the fact that nine doctors were called in, they have no doubt was miraculous. When the Queen Regent appears in public, she is frantically cheered as the mother-queen who saved the King, and during the week a great many Te Deums have been sung throughout the kingdom. Yesterday 3,000 grandees filed through the throne room before the Queen Regent to prove their loyalty, and addresses were presented from the Senate, Congress and other public bodies.

AGOP PASHA PLAYED OUT.

The Turkish Financial Minister Can't Keep Up With Demands.

LONDON, February 1.—The Turkish budget, ordered in a moment of enthusiasm by the Sultan, has not proved sufficiently symmetrical to the royal eye, and it has therefore been decorously added to the Finance Minister's archives. The Sultan's advisers are quarreling among themselves, each being unable to obtain funds for his departmental expenses, and only a moiety of his personal salary.

SOMETHING UNUSUAL

The President Scored Once More by Senator Farwell, Who WAS ONE OF GRESHAM'S CAPTAINS.

THE ENTIRE ILLINOIS DELEGATION IGNORED BY THE EXECUTIVE.

FARWELL SAYS IT MEANS DISRUPTION OF THE PARTY OF WHICH HE AND PRESIDENT HARRISON ARE MEMBERS.

Senator Farwell says that Clark's appointment as Collector of the Port at Chicago was confirmed with his consent. He thought it of no use to tell the President's appointment not confirmed. He says that Harrison has it in for him because the latter led a Gresham delegation at the Chicago Convention.

AN UNUSUAL PROCEEDING.

"The President's nomination of Mr. Clark," Mr. Farwell continued, "was a very astonishing and unusual proceeding, and in making it he wholly ignored the wishes of the Illinois delegation, and acted in a very strange manner toward them. He did not even consult any one of them. Mr. Campbell was not only the chairman of the choice of the people, and I construe President Harrison's action in this matter, his refusal to appoint Mr. Campbell, as a deliberate affront, and no doubt he intended it as such."

MR. HARRISON'S COGNATE.

"Why I happened to be the Chairman of the Illinois delegation in the last National Convention, and held the delegation solid for a number of ballots for Justice Gresham. I can see no other cause for his action. He seems to think that the office belongs to him personally, and not to the people. Mr. Lincoln thought otherwise. Mr. Campbell was Chairman of our committee, and devoted months of his time and his whole local energies for the election of Mr. Harrison. Mr. Clark did not do this. But then, this is Mr. Harrison's reward for political friends."

CARLISLE NOT TO BLAME.

Mr. Randall Refuses His Colleagues on the Senate Committee.

WASHINGTON, February 1.—Mr. Randall has made for publication a statement that the effort made to blame Mr. Carlisle for the non-reporting of rules from the Committee on Rules, is ridiculous. Mr. Carlisle, he says, is one of a minority, not responsible for the action of the committee, and that Mr. Carlisle, to his (Randall's) knowledge, and with his concurrence and authority, has been ever ready to meet and act—as a minority.

SILENT NOT IN TERREBONNE.

WASHINGTON, February 1.—Ex-Sergeant at Arms Leedom has received a telegram from the Mayor of Terrebonne, Canada, asking the Senator to visit the town. He declines, and adding that no family of the Thiebault is known there. Mr. Leedom is still without information as to Silcott's whereabouts.
