TO PROSECUTE ILLEGAL DEALERS.

Over Six Hundred of Them Said to be in Allegheny County.

THE EVIDENCE HAS BEEN COLLECTED

From present indications the speak-easy proprietors are destined to have pretty hard times within the next few months. First it was announced that the Police Department had collected evidence against them to be presented to the License Court. Then the variare of District Attorney Johnston and County Detective Langhorst was inaugurated, and now Collector Warmenstle has taken them in hands in behalf of the Government. He has asked for the appointment of a special officer, at a salary of \$100 per month, whose duty will be to prosecute all retail dealers and proprietors found selling without a Government license.

without a Government requires all dealers in malt ignors to pay a Government license of \$30, and those dealing in spiritous liquors are taxed \$35. It is estimated that the Government has lost at least \$15,000 of internal revenue through illegal liquor seliers this year, and Collector Warm-castle is determined that it shall not be re-rested.

When Special Agent Culbertson was in the ity recently inspecting Mr. Warmcastle's disrict, the two gentlemen had a consultation with regard to the matter, and the formal request was made for the appointment of a deective. Agent Culbertson promised to lay the axter before the department, together with he facts furnished by Collector Warmcastle as

hatter before the topic that he facus furnished by Collector Warmcastle as the state of affairs in Allegbeny county, and he need of something being done.

Mr. Warmcastle said yesierday he expected he agent would be appointed, but he did not know just how soon. It was reported that as soon as the information now in the hands of the police would be offered in court that he would take possession of it and use it in prosecuting the violators of the Government laws.

Mr. Warmcastle said it would not be necessary to do this. He has a great deal of information of his own, and is constantly collecting more. of his own, and is constantly collecting more. He also said that he did not think the police were in possession of any information he could not get by asking for it.

It is not thought the agent asked for will be given a permanent appointment. The only work to be done a. present is to prosecute the people who have violated the law this year. SPEAK-EASIES TO SUFFER. Mr. Warmcastle could not tell how many there were, but it is the impression that there

are over 600 in the county. Those who succeeded in getting a license from the Court last year have all taken out a Gov-ernment liceuse, so that the people Mr. warmcastle is after are speak-easy proprie-tors. The number is likely to be reduced next year, as it is expected more licenses will be granted. The special agent, if appointed, will be retained, boweyer, as long as there are any violators of the Government laws to be found. The other business of the district has been so enormous that no attention could be paid to the formous that no attention could be paid to the speak-easies by the regular deputies. There are 12 of these in the 24 counties. They look after the brewers, distillers, retail dealers and organ manufacturers and they find no time for er movements now insururated or

MAKING LIGHT FOR MANY.

Enlargement of the Electric Light Company's Plant a Necessity-A New Builds lug to be Erected-The Capacity to be More Than Doubled.

Having heard that the Allegheny Light Company contemplated the erection of a new station, a DISPATCH reporter yester-day called at the office of the company, and in conversation with one of the officials, ob-

tained the following information: "The company has for some time realized the ecessity of building a new station," said the gentleman, "the reason being that the recent aprovements have caused such an increase it lighting that their present station is becoming overloaded, and the fact that provision for future business must be made, was forced upon us. In the last few years incandescent lighting has grown from being but little beyond an experiment, to a system of great magnitude, and on a thoroughly commercial basis, the great step, of course, being made (as it was in the gas system) when the product could be sold by meter, instead of by a loose system of contract;

gas system) when the product could be sold by meter, instead of by a loose system of contract; as is well known in the gas companies, their first real success dated from this time; likewise in electric lighting, the great step from the doubtful to the thoroughly commercial basis was made when this change was introduced.

"The output of light of this company is now equal to about 800,000 cubic feet of gas per day, while this time three years ago it was not above one-sixth of that amount; this exceeds in size many gas plants in the smaller cities. Electric light, in consequence of its superior advantages, both in quality of light and the absence of vitiation of atmosphere, is bound eventually to supersede cater forms of fuel, and it is only a matter of a few years until this change will have gradually beeft made.

"As to the details of the new station, some time has been spent in gathering facts and ideas from the largest and most economical plants in the world. The station will, of course, be built in the neighborhood of one of the rivers, cheap water being one of the objects; the construction will be such as to allow of the cheapest and most economical fuel; the machines will have a capacity of from 5,000 to 10,000 16-candle-power lamps, probably the latter, as for a station of this size they will be none-too large. The output at a full load of one of these machines will have a capacity of from 5,000 and 6,000 cubic feet of gas per hour. The experience gained in studying plants in London, Berlin, and other large cities in the world, will be brought to bear to design all details as to give the most economical results.

"I could give you many figures on the com-arative cost of production of light, but do not bink it advisable to do so, but there is no think it advisable to do so, but there is no doubt of the fact that in the improved stations, manufacturing in large quantities, electric light can be made as cheaply as gas. The station, when built and fully equipped, will have a capacity in output for incandescent light alone equal to about \$00,000 cubic feet of gas per hour, and will be one of the largest stations in the world."

MR. CARNEGIE'S OFFER INDORSED,

The Millionaire Iron Man Denies That He

Has Selected a Site,

The Pittsburg Library Committee, of Councils, met 'yesterday afternoon in the City Clerk's office and recommended the ordinauce accepting the offer of Mr. Carnegie of a free library for the city. Mr. Lambie

Mr. Keating, in offering the motion to recommend the ordinance, said that as nearly all the prominent cities of the country were already provided with public libraries. Pittsburg would have been compelled sooner or later to do likewise, either through her public spirited citizens or by the city government. But Mr. Carnegle has very magnanimously stepped in with his princely offer and relieved the wealthy citizens of the necessity of providing the library so that they can now devote their means to some other object for the public benefit, and Mr. Keating had no doubt that with Mr. Carnegie's splendid precedent before them others would no doubt respond.

WILL PASS IT NEXT MONDAY.

WILL PASS IT NEXT MONDAY. It was decided by the committee that the ordinance would be printed and passed, if pos-sible, in both branches of Councils next Mon-

day. After the meeting an informal discussion of the location for the proposed central library was indulged in by several members of the committee. The majority favored a downtown site, Mr. Ford's preference being the cor-ner of Fifth avenue and Grant street across Grant street from the Court House and he said he had it from good authority that Mr. Carnegie would pay for the site of the building as well library itself, for which he had offered \$1,000, 000. Mr. Keating thought Mr. Carnegie would not consent to the location of the library in the East End, as suggested. Mr. Holliday favored locating the library on Duquesne way.
