VARIATIONS IN ITS THICKNESS

Render the Cast-Iron Product Unreliable and Dangerous.

A GOOD OPENING FOR A FOUNDRY HERE

"Isn't it strange there is no cast-iron pipe made in Pittsburg, although it is the great headcenter of the iron industry?" asked a prominent manufacturer of a DISPATCH reporter yesterday. "The demand for that class of pipe," he continued, for water and for purposes other than natural gas is very much in excess of the present capacity of the country, and yet there is not a foundry in Pittsburg, nor has there been one since the fallure of Marshall some years ago."

The peculiarity of these remarks brought about an investigation which developed the fact that, although cast-iron pipe can be produced at a much lower cost, it is not always the safest or most reliable. It will be remembered that a struggle ensued last fall between east and wrought iron pipe manu-facturers for the material which the Columbus Natural Gas Company proposed using. At-that time a number of cast-iron manuacturers claimed they were able to furnish pipe, thoroughly uniform in thickness and uality, which would withstand the pressure equired for lines laid from fields registerog heavy volumes of natural gas.

MORE RAPID TRANSIT READY.

The Allegheny Crosstown Line Begins to Run Its Cars.

The regular operation of the Crosstown Electric Railway, a branch of the Pleasant Valley line, was begun yesterday morning. The line runs from Superior station, at the lower end of Allegheny, along Superior avenue, Sedgwick and Washington streets, to the main line of the Pleasant Valley road, at the corner of Washington and Fremont. One fare will be charged from the outer end of the line to the Pittsburg terminus. Ten cars are run on the main line and six on the Crosstown line, so that cars now leave the corner of Smithfield street and Six avenue about every three minutes. The expectation is that the electric cars will be placed upon the East street line within

ten days.

The following distinguishing shields will be placed on the ends of the cars of the several lines: Main line to Charles street red Maltese cross; the Crosstown line, a low keystone; the East street line, a biue shield; the Observatory Hall line, a white star. At night there will be illuminated glass signs of the same designs.
