The A. B. Were the gas which is expelling the oil utilized, this \$52-an-hour gusher would make in addition a fair payer as a gas well. There was but one flow pipe at work and great care was necessary in letting on the force that it should not be great enough to drive the oil out of the tank, even when the fluid was six feet from the top. The roar that accompanied the flow was equal to that of escaping steam from a lecomotive boiler carring 300-pounds pressure of steam.
