## PRIDE IN THE STUDY.

Characteristics Demanded of Pastors Who Would be Successful.

FROM ENVY, HATRED AND MALICE

Good Lord, Deliver Us, is a Prayer Essential for Ministers.

A very high standard was that held up by the Rev. S. L. Palmer as the one for the true pastor to attain, in his paper read before the Presbyterian ministers' meeting on Monday morning on "The Bible Ideal of a in favor of granting licenses to preach at the Christian Minister." Among many other

attainments essential he said: The first important work to be performed in the construction of any building is to lay a good foundation. "A bishop should be the husband of one wife," the general idea of which is he should have but one at a time. But there existed among the Jews and heathen a strong prejudice against a second marriage. The question, however, is one that need not call forth much discussion now. The fact that it is commonly practiced without harm being wrought as to its influence upon the public is sufficient to give each one liberty to act according to the dictates of his own conscience. But if Paul were here to-day we would be hard pressed, no doubt, to find any reason for thinking that he would not apply the rule to us as closely as he did to the Gentile bishops of his day and say as he did to Timothy, let "a bishop be the husband of one wife." He must ever be on the watch, keenly alive to see what ought to be done. He must be able to exercise cool, dispassionate reason, self-controlled, self-possessed, capable of restraining himself, and avoid showing undue excitement. His tone, look and general appearance must be in kreping with his profession, as outward appearance has more to do with a minister's influence than we think. He should not spend all his time and means in entertaining the members of his church, his neighbors or his friends, but he should have a noble, generous heart that would respond to the call of strangers or friends. To turn away in coldness when opportunity was offered to extend the hospitality of a home to a brother in need was not in the mind of this great lover of mankind when he expressed this thought. He must have not only a fitness to teach, but also a dis-He must be able to exercise cool, dis only a fitness to teach, but also a dis-position, a readiness that will make him prompt to improve opportunities when offered. A minister might have all the education and culture possible to secure, and be lacking in the earnest desire and readand be lacking in the earnest desire and readiness, and all other preparations would go for naught. No one of experience will deny the assertion that it requires not a little executive ability to govern well a household. To draw the line between love and duty is not a triffe. If the minister then fails to govern well his own house, how can he be expected to possess in greater measure the same qualifications which are required to influence the church? The minister who is given to the use of wine in any form, not only fails to come up to the Bible standard, but falls far below that of common people and common morality, and that is saying much. He must not strike either with hand or tongue. Mr. Moody did once set an example by threshing a young man in the Sunday school, by threshing a young man in the Sunday school out it would not be well, perhaps, to try to imibut it would not be well, perhaps, to try to imitate Mr. Moody in everything. Ministers are sometimes very severe critics on each other's gifts, and by their remarks bring themselves into contempt with people who would otherwise be benefited. The surroundings of ministers expose them to many temptations. "Young men," said a wise bishop to a graduating class, "you may be both ugly and dull, but there will be at least some silly woman ready to tell you that you are so smart and so handsome." Once tainted by this spirit the next step is jealousy. A young and generous mind some." Once tainted by this spirit the next step is jealousy. A young and generous mind revolts from such things and suspects the system that produces them. Verily in despising each other's gifts, in speaking lightly of each other preachers do the devil service. "From eavy, hatred and malice, good Lord, deliver us." He must not be a novice. Pride goes with ministers to their studies, it chooses their subjects, their words and ornaments. God bids us be as plain as we can, but pride stands by and contradicts all, it dishonors our sermons with childish conceits. Thus it makes mean sermons, and what pride makes, the devil makes. When pride makes the sermon it goes also into the pulpit and forms the tone sets them fin pursuit of vain applause, it makes them seek themselves and deny God. When the sermon is over pride goes home with them and makes them more eager to know whether they were applauded, than whether they prevailed with any to the saving of their souls, Ministers are to ask wisdom of God that they be kept

It then had 250 members, now nearly 2,500; and five other churches have been formed out of it. The good doctor has made happy or sad 682 couples, baptized 962 children, preached nearly 3,000 germons. His church has given 806,000 for benevolent objects and used \$700,000 for its home expenses. Beside his many pastoral duties, which have bever been neglected, he has been a prolife writer of books, tracts and newspaper articles. Surely if any shall receive as their reward the "well done" of their Maker when life's duties shall have been ended none will be more worthy than Rev. Theodore Lidyard Cuyler, D. D., whose days we trust may yet be many.

Whereas, it appears by the petition and affidavit on fle in the office of the Clerk of Councils that one-third in interest of the owners of property fronting find abutting upon the said street have petitioned the Councils of said city to exact an ordinance for the grading, paving and carbing of the same; therefore, section I—Be it ordained and enacted by the city of Pittsburg, in Select and Common Council.

Section 2—That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance is hereby repealed so far as the same affects this ordinance. Ordained and enacted into a law in Councils street have petitioned the Councils of said city to exact an ordinance for the grading, paving and carbing of the same; therefore, Section I—Be it ordained and enacted by the city of Pittsburg, in Select and Common Council.
