FROM A STAFF CORRESPONDENT WASHINGTON, April 18 .- Many Republicans who have not followed closely the appointments of postmasters, appear to think that movements in that direction have been very slow. Harry Anderson Tells to Detectives a Tale of His Wanderings

The Officers Admit His Narrative is a Very

Plausible One. FITZGERALD'S FIGHT WITH THE MAN

Harry B. Anderson, the colored man who s now confined in jail on the charge of being implicated in the murder of Mrs. Rudert, yesterday made a statement of his life for the past year, to Detectives Fitzgerald, McTighe and Shore. It was taken by a stenographer.

He began his tale of woe from the time he left the penitentiary. In his statement he

"My home is in Philadelphia, but I was oorn in Atlanta, Ga. I was released from the Riverside Penitentiary June 10, 1889. I went at once to Indiana, Pa., and was imployed there by Mrs. Clements, at the Indiana House. On June 17 I returned to Pittsburg, remained there a week and then went back to Indiana. I was at the Indiana House until August 3. Then I went to the American House, in the same town, being employed there by Martin Earheart, the proprietor. I remained there until Decem-ber 17, when I secured a room at the Kinter House and got work at Wagley's restaurant. I worked there until about Christmas, and the Saturday after Christmas I went to Blairsville.

HIS STOP IN BLAIRSVILLE. "On December 29 I engaged to go to work in Blairsville for Charles Wilkinson, in the Union Hotel. Then I went to Johnstow and stayed at the Fourth Ward Hotel until Sunday evening. On December 30 I returned to Blairsville Intersection, and from there I walked into Blairsville. I remained at the Union Hotel until February 23, when I went to Latrobe and got employment with L. H. Court, at the Parker House. I went A. M. I remained there until April 5, when I came to Pittsburg with Michael Dennon. After spending a few hours here I started for Wellsville, O. I took the next train from there to East Liverpool, and stayed that night at the Hilbert House. Next day I went to work for John Robinson at the Brunt Hotel, and stayed there until Mr. Fitzersald hought me here?"

Fitzgerald brought me here."

The police regard the story as a plausible one, but Detectives Fitzgerald and Gilkinson will leave for Indiana this morning to substantiate Anderson's statement.

Detective Fitzgerald, in speaking about

the case yesterday, gave a new chapter of the story. "When I arrested Anderson in East Liverpool," said the detective, "I walked up to him and held out my hand He shook hands, but instead of leaving go I held on, and in an instant I had the irons on him. He made a fight and both of us fell into the street, but not before I had tapped him several times on the head. SETTLED HIS PRISONER.

"Then some fellow come along who wanted ten minutes of train time he refused, but then said he would go, provided he was not "I suppose he expected to escape by this

move, so I surprised him by accepting his offer. I knew I could run faster than he could, and if he could hit any harder than I he was welcome to do so. I walked beside him up to the train. 




