

DEATH INEMPTY CANS

The Mysterious Explosion That Killed Mrs. Anne Edwards. THE VICTIM EIGHTY YEARS OLD.

Special Telegram to the Dispatch. BUTLER, April 30.—Mrs. Anne Edwards, aged 80, who lived on the hill west of town, was instantly killed this evening by an explosion that tore the limbs from her body and shattered her home from top to bottom.

It is believed that while she was handling these cans, the small quantity of explosive material remaining in them was set off. The porch where the explosion occurred was a kitchen, and small pieces of human flesh were found scattered about the yard.
