California floods delay trains.

 Elias O'Brien, of North Woburn, Mass., aged 13, died yesterday of hydrophobia. A year ago the child was severely bitten by a dog, supposed then to have the rabies.  
 S. N. Stern, of the firm of Stern & Son, clothing, Broadway, New York, was instantly killed by the electric cars at Elizabeth, N. J. Head and both arms were severed from the body.  
**FATHER SHEEDY TRIPPED UP.**  
 How a Smart Young Man Settled in the First Ward and Married.  
 A wedding causing considerable talk on the Hill on account of the secret way in which the contracting parties went about it, leaked out yesterday afternoon. W. J. Robinson, of Pride street, son of J. S. Robinson, who is identified with several building and loan associations at No. 131 Fifth avenue, was married to Miss Mary Owens, of Bankville. The young lady's religious views conflict with those of the family of young Robinson. On this account the marriage was not sanctioned by the father of the groom, and he knew nothing of the wedding until told of it by a Dr. Johnson, who reported yesterday afternoon. Mr. Robinson said, when told of the marriage of his son: "This is the first intimation I have had of my son's marriage, and I do not approve of it, as he did not get my consent to marry the young lady, of whom I know nothing. As William is old enough to obtain a marriage license without my consent, I, of course, could not prevent it."  
 A call was made at the residence of Rev. Father Sheedy, who married the couple. Father Sheedy is not accustomed to announce the marriages of persons from the pulpit if either one of the parties is a Protestant. I did not know Robinson, and as he had a marriage license, I could not refuse to marry them. He told me he was stopping at the Keystone Hotel, on Fourth avenue, and as this is in my parish, I had to comply with the young man's request."  
 Both parties are well known in social circles. The groom for many years has been connected with the insurance firm of J. D. Biggins & Co., on Fourth avenue, where he holds a very important and responsible position. Miss Owens' family are quite well to do.  
**REVERSED THE LOWER COURT.**  
 Application Denied for a Receiver for the Etna Iron Works Company.  
 CINCINNATI, May 10.—The Circuit Court to-day reversed two decrees of the Common Pleas Court, one for the appointment of a receiver for the Etna Iron Works Company, of Lawrence county, of which Adolph Plummer of this city is President, and another of a dissolution of the company. The decree was issued by the Common Pleas Court upon application of Plummer, and the Circuit Court finds that there was both a lack of jurisdiction and a lack of essential averment of insolvency to authorize the action of the Common Pleas Court.  
**A MISPLACED SWITCH.**  
 Wrecks a Freight Train and Kills Three Railroaders.  
 AUBURN, ILL., May 10.—A misplaced switch threw the engine and several cars of a freight train on the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad from the track at midnight near Wanet last night. They rolled down an embankment. Engineer S. F. Adams and F. J. Maddock were killed, and buried beneath the wreck. It is reported that brakeman Reed was also killed.
