COAL MINERS READY TO STRIKE.

Rev. Dr. Beale, of Johnstown, to be tried by the Presbytery.

ALL THE NEWS FROM NEARBY TOWNS

WARREN, May 13.—Miss Alice G. McGee, aged 21 years, daughter of Joseph McGee, oil producer of this place, was today admitted to practice in the Warren county courts by Judge William D. Brown.

Miss McGee is handsome, intelligent and a very clever office lawyer. She passed the best examination passed in Warren county in ten years. Judge Brown complimented her on her efficiency. She studied with Noyes & Hinchey, and she is the second woman ever admitted to practice in Pennsylvania, the other being Mrs. Carrie Kilgore, who was admitted at Philadelphia a few years ago.

PRISONERS BREAK JAIL.

By Sawing a Hole Through the Roof and Making Ropes of Blankets.

MARTINSBURG, Va., May 13.—Seven prisoners have escaped from jail. The fugitives are Francis Martin, Charles Harrington, James Ford, William Cross, Thomas Murray, Albert Mack and a negro boy named Oscar Williams. The four first mentioned were arrested in Baltimore recently for a robbery in Martinsburg two weeks ago. Murray and Marks were tramps claiming to be a brother and sister, and were committed for disorderly conduct.

The prisoners effected their escape by sawing a hole through the ceiling of their cell, after which they made ropes of blankets and let themselves down from the cell, a distance of about 25 feet. Just as the last man was escaping through the opening in the ceiling he was discovered, and was forced to return to his cell again. The jailer was awakened, and with other officers started in pursuit of the fugitives. The jail is an old stone structure, and has long been considered unsafe.

CADIZ CYCLOIZED.

Houses, Barns, Orchards, Fences and Forests Destroyed by the Storm.

CADIZ, May 13.—Cadiz has been cut off from telegraphic communication with the outside world since Saturday night. The most terrific cyclone that ever struck this county swept over a part of Archer and Greens townships Saturday night. Houses, barns, fences and orchards were completely destroyed.

James Magaw, a farmer living about four miles west of here, sustained the most damage. His tenement house, situated about 20 yards from his dwelling, was wrecked, and his residence greatly damaged. From Magaw's farm a hole through the ceiling of his barn, a distance of about three miles, there were no buildings in the course of the storm, but several were destroyed. James Burby's barn was destroyed. The track of the storm was about 20 yards wide. At Crawford, two miles from here, trees were blown across the railroad tracks and the telegraph wires broken down.

CAPTURED IN UTAH.

A Jefferson Man Brought Back for Trial on a Serious Charge.

WAXBURGH, May 13.—Deputies T. R. and E. S. Goodwin arrived here last evening with their prisoner, James Vance, who is wanted here on a charge of kidnapping. After the death of Annie Pihl several weeks ago, upon whose statement the charge is based, a warrant was issued for young Vance, but he eluded the officers, and went to Ogden, Utah. His location being learned, his photograph and an offer of a reward was sent to the Chief of Police of that city, and he was arrested. Upon his arrival here he was taken to the Sheriff's office where he was awarded by the judge a \$5,000 bond for his appearance at the June term of court, and his stepfather, Steve Blackledge, gave him the amount. He was then released, and went to his home in Jefferson.

READY TO STRIKE.

Coke Region Miners Prepared to Quit at a Moment's Notice.

SCOTTSBURGH, May 13.—The Knights of Labor employed at the Fick coke plants are quietly resting on their oars ready to strike at a moment's notice. Labor officials state that by a close estimate six or seven hundred men are against the movement from here to Bradford. They are greatly encouraged at the outlook for a successful strike.

Secretary Watchorn will be here to-morrow, and will thoroughly investigate the coke-region troubles. A conference of labor leaders was held here to-day, but nothing was disclosed. No notice has yet been issued for a convention on Thursday, and it will probably not be held until next week. The strike continues in the Johnstown district, although several great efforts have been made by the operators to break it.

MAY HAVE BEEN MURDERED.

He Leaves Home With \$1,000 and Has Not Been Seen Since.

CANTON, May 13.—The disappearance of a young man named Myers, living near Randolph, 15 miles south of this city, since April 10, excites suspicion and fears of foul play by his friends. He left home that day, going to New Philadelphia, where he drew \$1,000 from the bank saying he was going to Canton. The last seen of him was while waiting to take the Valley train for the same evening. His description tallies with that of reports sent out of a young man murdered at Terre Haute, Ind., and the Mayor of Canton has been asked for a mere definite description.

A STUBBORN TRUANT.

Jumps Through a Window and Gives the Officers a Lively Chase.

JOHNSTOWN, May 13.—Willie Grain, a young lad, was arrested this afternoon and placed in jail to await a hearing on a charge of truancy. Blending the attention of the officers he jumped through an open window, falling 14 feet to the ground, and, after a lively chase, was captured and locked up. The lad is very stubborn and threatens to make it lively for those who caused his arrest.

GREENSBURG FLOODS.

Residents Forced to Move and Fences and Garden Trunk Destroyed.

GREENSBURG, May 13.—The heavy rains this afternoon caused considerable damage by flood. On the flats south of here, the water is ten feet deep. People were compelled to leave their houses. Gardens are destroyed, bridges have been washed away and fences cut down the stream. The damage is reported from Penn and Jeannette. A good deal of damage has also been done along the Sewickley creek.

BURNED TO DEATH.

A Woman Crept in the Presence of Her Helpless Children.

POINT PLEASANT, W. Va., May 13.—Mrs. George Thornton, residing at Eighteen Mile Creek, this county, was fatally burned to-day. Her husband was absent, and while crossing the room she fell in a fire into the fireplace and burned to death in the presence of her two children, who were unable to put her out of the flames. She was of a well-to-do family.

SURVEYING FOR THE SHIP CANAL.

The Big Shenango Route Declared to be 25 Miles the Shortest.

GREENSBURG, May 13.—The surveyors of the proposed ship canal reached here to-night, coming down the Big Shenango. They claim it is 25 miles shorter than any other.

A Brakenham's Terrible Death.

CONNELLYVILLE, May 13.—George Cas-

mer, a Baltimore and Ohio brakeman, was run over and instantly killed in the yard here this afternoon. His body was terribly mutilated, being severed twice and strewn along the tracks. Kammerer was not yet of age. His home was at Paele, Somerset county.

DR. BEALE HAS FRIENDS.

Who Object to the Proposed Manner of Installing His Case.

JOHNSTOWN, May 13.—A committee, consisting of three ministers and three elders of the Presbyterian Church, of which Rev. Mr. Milligan, of Jeannette, is Chairman, arrived here to-night to inquire into the trouble in the Presbyterian Church here. Contrary to the general opinion that a church meeting would be held, at which the members would have the privilege of being heard, this committee announced that the matter would be considered in an official capacity by them, and the testimony which they had at a committee, would be presented to the June meeting of the Presbytery.

The house was crowded at the meeting to-night, but after the preaching of a sermon by Rev. Mr. Milligan the announcement was made to the effect that they would not be heard, but that a meeting between the officials and the pastor would be held in the morning to try to effect a reconciliation, and if not successful, then in the afternoon they would begin taking action. The determination to conduct the matter in this way, and many declare that this is prejudicial to Dr. Beale's case. INSIST UPON THE COLUMBUS SCALE.

Miners Meet at Sutersville and Reaffirm Their Demands Upon the Operators.

SUTERSVILLE, May 13.—A delegate meeting of miners was held at Sutersville yesterday and resolutions unanimously adopted demanding that the operators of the district, which includes the miners of the Baltimore and Ohio and the Pittsburgh, McKeesport and Youngs-borough roads, sign the Columbus scale of prices for the mining of all coal shipped West during the current year. KIDNAPED WITH A BOARDER.

A Youngstown Woman Run Away but Is Soon Captured.

While the couple were waiting at Canfield, ten miles from here, they were overtaken by the officers. Porter asserts his intention of preventing a kidnapping, and will care for the children deserted by the fugitives mother.

SLID DOWN TO DEATH.

JOHNSTOWN, May 13.—The family of Hon. Matthew Griswold was terribly bereaved to-day. The little 4-year-old daughter, Jennie Wittermore, when called to dinner, attempted to slide down the banister. She fell, and striking on her head, received such injuries as resulted in her death.

Hon. Matthew Griswold was slated as Congressman Culbertson's competitor for Congressional honors at the coming fall election, and his bereavement may make some difference in the plans.

CHICAGO A BAD PLACE.

Two Erie Men Murdered There Within the Week.

CHICAGO, May 13.—There seems to be a strange fatality attending the career of Erie young men in Chicago. A fortnight ago Dennis Mackin, a promising young hotel clerk, was stabbed to death in a Chicago hotel. To-day the remains of Thomas Kelley were brought from Chicago. The young man was found dead in his room, and a man who brought him morphine is charged with Kelley's murder.

BEAVER FALLS IN THE MUD.

Citizens Defeat a Proposition to Borrow \$200,000 for Street Improvements.
