Against a Gas Company.

INPECIAL TRIEGRAM TO THE DISPATCE. ERIE, May 15 .- A few months ago the people of Erie undertook to boycott the Pennsylvania Gas Company on account of a raise in the rates. The boycott failed, and the City Council asked the courts for an injunction to compel the Pennsylvania Company to take up its pines and abandon its million-dollar plant. The grounds were that the company had refused to furnish the manu-

facturing establishments gas as they had promised when Council gave the company the use of The company demurred, and the Court sustained this to-day, and discussed the bill, ruling that the Councils could vote the company the use of the streets or not, but could name no conditions. The revenue of the gas company from the city is over \$400,000 annually.

REFUSES TO GO WITH HIS MOTHER.

Final Settlement in the Cowan Domi

Trouble Defented by the Son. SPECIAL TELEGRAM TO THE DISPATCH.) NEW CASTLE, Pa., May 15 .- Nearly a year ago Mrs. John M. Cowan was sent to Dixmont Insane Hospital for treatment by her husband on a certificate signed by reputable physicians. Mrs. Cowan is the heiress to quite a sum of money by the death of a relative in Germany, and she claimed that her husband had her and she claimed that her husband had her placed in Dixmont because she would not turn over this money to him. Three months ago Dr. Hutchinson, of Dixmont, wrote to Mr. Cowan that his wife was in a condition that she could be taken from the hospital. According to Mrs. Cowan's story, her husband did not take her out of the asylum when he could have done so, and when she had been pronounced same. Three weeks ago Mrs. Cowan arrived in New Castle. She found her husband gone, her home broken up and her 9-year-old son at Mr. Cowan's mother's in Butler county. Three or four days ago she made an information before the Mayor.

Cowan came to New Castle, was arrested and a hearing took place yesterday. An agreement was finally made that Mr. Cowan was to have the custody of the child and a separation was to follow. The boy, however, refuses to go with his mother, and the case will be finally settled in court. Pending this an uncle of the boy will care for him.
