Chief Brown, after several consultations with Chief Brown and Alderman Gripp and McKenna, has decided that the order issued last Wednesday by Chief Brown was entirely too sweeping. The Mayor has decided to allow the acceptance of forfeits at police stations, and yesterday directed Chief Brown to prepare a schedule of amounts to be accepted in different cases.

A reporter for THE DISPATCH to Mayor said yesterday: "Your money is better than my bond. The refusal of cash deposits would, I see, often work hardships. A man from Greensburg, whom I know to be a good citizen at home, came here three weeks ago and got drunk. He was arrested, but had his pockets full of money. Had he been required to produce a bond he might have been unable to do so, and that is what the Chief should have authority to release prisoners under certain circumstances. I have no objection to the exercise of that privilege. I did not mean that Chief Brown should issue an order as extensive in its meaning as he did, but he followed the strict construction of my note to him." It was simply a case of misunderstanding.
